required to undergo a rigid and prolonged quarantine. All vessels or boats of any character hav-

ing sickness on board on arrival, or having had sickness any time during the voyage, are required to come to the station for inwhence they came. Vessels not included as above will proceed without detention. Pilots are especially enjoined to make careful inquiry relative to vessel, crew, &c., and if not satisfied with the statements of the captain or commander, or if the vessel is in a filthy condition they will bring the vessel to the station for further examination. Pilots wilfully violating the quarantine laws are subject to a forfeiture of their branch: masters of vessels to a fine of two hundred dollars a day for every day they violate the quarantine laws, and all other persons are liable for each and every offence. All vessels subject to visitation under the acove regulations will set a flag in the main rigging, port side. Press Convention Echoes.
