Important Treasury Decisions.

WASHINGTON, June 8. The Secretary of the Treasury has made the following decisions: A penal duty of 100 per cent, on omitted commission charges is to be added to invoice value.

Payment of hospital dues is a condition precedent to the entry or documenting of vessels of the United States.

Only one per centum is to be retained for the use of the United States on the amount of all drawbacks allowed on refined sugars exported on and after March 31st last.

Goods, the product of a country east of the Cape of Good Hope, imported, exported and re-imported from a country west of said cape are liable to discriminating duty.

Caus made of imported zinc are entitled to drawback on exportation. Local steamboat inspectors may issue a certificate designating the place or places in steamers in which petroleum may be carried or stowed upon routes where there is no other practical mode of transporting it.

With reference to goods shipped via two or more bonded routes through the United States, the department cannot allow such shipments to be made under combined entry without a prior examination and appraisement of the goods.

Goods in warehouse exported and reimported are to be treated as new importation. Oil or spirits turpentine may be carried on steam vessels when the same are put up in good metallic vessels or casks or barrels, well and securely bound with iron and stowed in a secure part of the steamer, as required by law.

The invoice value is to be stated in the currency of the country where goods are purchased.

Wife Killing.

A most atrocious and deliberate murder was committed at Edward's Station, on the Northeastern Railroad, some sixteen miles below Florence, S. C. The unfortunate woman murdered was Mrs. Hall, the wife of one W. C. Hall. The husband and wife had some difference about her refusing to sign the title to a piece of property which Hall had sold. Hall left for Texas some weeks ago, after selling the property, a store, to Reuben Jordan, who occupied the front and Mrs. Hall the back part of the house. On Sunday last Mrs. Hall was found dead in her room, and a jury of inquest decided that she came to her death by strangulation. A day or two after the murder Hall married a young lady near Wadesboro, instead of being in Texas, as he was reported to have been. Suspicion points very strongly to Hall and Jordan as being implicated in this foul murder.

A New Theory of the \$17,500 Treasury Hoax.

In 1871 a package of \$50,000 was stolen from the City National Bank of New Orleans, and was never accounted for until a few months afterwards a noted thief was arrested for some offense, convicted and sentenced to the penitentiary at Nashville. After conviction he made a general confession, implicating himself in the celebrated Scooter diamond robbery at New Orleans, and confessed to taking the \$50,000 package above mentioned by means of a fine wire with a steel hook at the end passed over the screens at a time when the cashier was within less than five feet of the money. The theory is that the treasury robbery was done by this means from the gallery running around the cash room. It will be remembered that the day of the robbery was dull and cloudy, and the robber might have attracted the package unseen by running the fine steel hook into the seam of the envelope.

The Secretary of the Interior has appointed Governor Axtell, of Utah Territory, to be Governor of New Mexico, vice Giddings deposed, and Geo. W. Emery to be the Governor of Utah, vice Axtell.

Mr. Weld, who was arrested in the Post-office last week for robbing the mails, is the eighth clerk arrested at that office during the present year by special agent Field, against all of whom there was abundant proof of guilt.

There is a statement in newspaper correspondence from Greece that Prince George, second son of the King of Denmark and brother of the future Queen of England and the Empress of Russia, is so tired of his sovereignty that he desires to abdicate.

The Richmond Enquirer says that Admiral Raphael Semmes is as indiscreet as a politician as he was brave as an officer. His address at Mobile, in commemoration of the late John C. Breckinridge was altogether ill-timed and unworthy the occasion.

The Pennsylvania Republicans.

WASHINGTON, June 8. All of the Senators and Representatives now here converse freely on the political situation, the third term letter, &c. Senator Cameron unbosomed himself to-day to a remarkable degree. He said his views had been disregarded so much that he should not obtrude them upon the administration hereafter. He thinks that Pennsylvania ought to have had a cabinet position, but says now that no citizen of that State of prominence would sacrifice his self-respect by accepting a place in the cabinet of President Grant. He thinks that the action of the Republican Convention in cutting loose from Grant has wonderfully improved the prospects of the party, and he thinks Hartranft will be elected Governor by a rousing majority. Senator Cameron says that the opportunity was offered him to name the successor to Mr. Hill, the late Assistant Attorney General, but that he did not avail himself of it. He don't think that Pennsylvania republicanism is helped by any favors from this administration. All this looks as if the President and the Pennsylvania Republicans were not working in harmony.

Senator Morton and the Next President.

(Special Telegram to the Dispatch.) WASHINGTON, June 9. Senator Morton has been busy enough since he has been in Washington in advancing as far as possible his interests as Presidential candidate. He has had several consultations with Government officers of high station concerning the distribution of the offices in his favor. He had a long interview to-day with the Attorney General, at which it is understood he avowed his intention to enter actively upon the campaign in his own behalf. There are rumors afloat that there has been a serious breach between Morton and Bristow on the subject of disposing of the offices.
