Important Treasury Decisions. WASHINGTON, June 8. The Secretary of the Treasury has made the following decisions:

A penal duty of 100 per cent. on omitted commission charges is to be added to invoice value. Payment of hospital dues is a con-

dition precedent to the entry or documenting of vessels of the United Only one per centum is to be retained for the use of the United States on the amount of all drawbacks al-

lowed on refined sugars exported on and after March 3rd last Goods, the product of a country east of the Cape of Good Hope, imported, exported and re-imported from a country west of said cape are liable to discriminating duty.

Caus made of imported zinc are en-titled to drawback on exportation. Local steamboat inspectors may issue a certificate designating the place or places in steamers in which petroleum may be carried or stowed upon routes where there is no other

With reference to goods shipped via two or more bonded routes through the United States, the department cannot allow such shipments to be made under combined entry without a prior examination and apprisement of the goods.

Goods in warehouse exported and reimported are to be treated as new importation.

Oil or spirits turpentine ma carried on steam vessels when the same are put up in good metallic vessels or casks or barrels, well and securely bound with iron and stowed in a secure part of the steamer, as required by law.

The invoice value is to be stated in the courtency of the country where goods are purchased.


The Pennsylvania Republicans.

WASHINGTON, June 8. All of the Senators and Represen tatives now here converse freely on the political situation, the third term letter, &c. Senator Cameron unbosomed himself to-day to a remarkable degree. He said his views had been disregarded so much that he should not obtrude them upon the administration hereafter. He thinks that Pennsylvania ought to have had a cabinet position, but says now that no citizen of that State of prominence would sacrifice his self-respect by acceptling a place in the cabinet of President Grant. He thinks that the action of the Republican Convention in cutting loose from Grant has wonderfully improved the prospects of the party, and he thinks Hartranft will be elected Governor by a rousing majority. Senator Cameron says that the opportunity was offered him to name the successor to Mr. Hill, the late Assistant Attorney General, but that he did not avail himself of it. He don't think that Pennsylvania republicanism is helped by any favors from this administration. All this looks as if the President and the Pennsplvania Republicans were not working in harmony.
