THE RECENT HOMICIDE.

Preliminary Investigation of the Case of William Jackson alias Caleb P. Snow-The Prisoner Committed for the Action of the Superior Court.

W. H. Moore, J. P., convened Court in the Superior Court room, yesterday, for the purpose of having a preliminary investigation of the case of the State vs. William Jackson alias Caleb P. Snow.

The case was called at 101 o'clock. Adam Empie, Esq., appeared for the defence. There was seemingly a lack of interest in the trial few more being inside of the Court room than might be found there on any ordinary occasion, while in the street in front everything seemed as quiet as a dull summer evening—no crowd, no excitement, no anything. Upon the bench, as sedate and solemn as a dark night, sat Squire Moore.

The witnesses were called and took the following oath, which was administered by the sable 'Squire:

"You and each of you swear that you will tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth between the State and William Jackson."

Albert Thomson, one of the members of the serenading band, was the first witness examined. His testimony has been heretofore given and referred to in these columns, and not differing in any material point on this occasion, we refrain from publishing it. During the examination of this witness, the counsel for the defendant was necessarily called away, and, the Court refusing to proceed in his absence, a long stoppage in the proceedings took place. The Court and spectators remained in silence during the entire time, and the wheels of government were seemingly stopped. Nothing could be heard save the munching of peanuts and the harmonious snores that proceeded from the nodding heads of several weary listeners who occupied the corners

The prisoner signified to the Court that he was willing for the examination to proceed (his counsel had sent a message to that effect as the testimony was being reduced to writing by an officer of the court), but the 'Squire refused, saying that the law was otherwise, adding "This Court can't be bribed." In due time, however, the counsel returned and the examination proceed. ed. At the conclusion of the testimony of Thomson, Ransom McMillan was called, in whose testimony there was no material variance, that we were able to observe, from

that previously given by him. The testimony of the three remaining witnesses we give quite fully as it has not

been heretofore published: James M. Cowan, a witness for the State. being duly sworn, says: I was on Princess street, near Water; heard a pistol fire; I walked down Water, across Market street; met a colored man standing at the gun; he asked me what time it was; I told him about half-past 3. I proceeded on towards Gilbert's bar: on the corner of the alley I met Ransom McMillan and Albert Thomson coming out; Ransom McMillan asked me if I heard that pistol fire; I told him I did and thought it was across the river. He also asked me who was that standing at the post, whether it was a policeman; I told him it was a colored man standing there; he observed to me that whoever shot that pistol shot Jackson, the barkeeper, in the finger or somewhere. I immediately hurried in; asked Jackson if he was hurt badly; he told me not bad, and asked me to take that man out there; I did so. Going out I met Ransom and Thomson coming back, who said that Charley Jackson was dead; I told him I reckoned not, that they were up all night drinking and playing around, and I thought he was asleep; I asked him where he (the deceased) was; he said he was at the corner. Burgess and myself passed on to the corner, the colored man still standing there. He (deceased) was lying with his head to the north, on his left side, his left arm under him, his right arm lying on the curbstone of the pavement. I immediately went to work and examined him; I felt his pulse. I moved his right arm and examined his heart, and found that he was dead. Burgess was standing there at the time; he left then and said he was going home Ransom McMillan and Albert Thomson came up at this time: Burgess walked up towards the market house. Ransom halloed out to arrest that man, he had shot and killed his brother; Burgess was arrested and brought back. At that time the police whistle was blown, and several of the policemen came down. Instant Death from Lightning.

Last evening at a few minutes past ? o'clock while the storm was at its height and sudden lightning lit up the gloomy skies in all directions, followed by the deafening roar of thunder, a colored man named Perry Turner, was killed instantly by the lightning. The deceased was aged about forty years and had been in the employ of Mr. R. M. Orrell, as a lighter hand. He was unmarried and was boarding with a colored family who lives in the South side of Castle street, between Second and Third streets. At this house his death took place. A colored woman who lives there had gone out of the down stairs room of the house leaving the deceased quietly setting on the floor near the fireplace as if resting himself from the fatigue of his day's labor. She soon observed a vivid flash of lightning, which startled her considerably, followed by a crash, and she then became much concerned for her children, and on looking for them immediately, discovered the deceased lying on the floor, just where she left him, but a few minutes

before, apparently cold and lifeless. A doctor was sent for, after some little delay, who declared Turner to be dead. It seems, from an inspection of the premises, that the lightning struck the top of the house first, as it is considerably wrecked. and then must have passed down the chimney, and as the position of the deceased was in the draft between a staircase and the chimney, he was just in a position to get the full charge. There was no mark whatever discovered upon the body of the deceased, and the room bore no evidence of further damage having been done except two small holes about the size of pistol balls which appeared in the ceiling of the room, in front of the chimney.
