#### MAGISTRATES' COURT.

Conclusion of the Preliminary investigation of the Assault Open

The court for the investigation of the above case opened yesterday morning at 10 o'clock in the Superior Court room, Justices VanAmringe and Gardner presiding.

There were a number of witnesses to be examined, besides those who testified on Saturday, the first day of the trial and the hearing of the cause occupied several hours. The defendants Peter Lee and Win. and John Fisher, were arraigned, the former being represented by Marsden Bellamy, Esq., and the two latter by John London, Esq. The State was represented by John

L. Holmes, Esq. H. Bonum sworn, testified: I never asked these Fishers to come to my place and hunt; Wm. Fisher came to me and asked me to treat him the day after Mr. Harper was shot; I refused to have any conversation with him; I told him I had not money enough to treat, and never went into a bar-

room with him. James Hewlett sworn, testified: Mr. Harper and myself were in the market together the same evening he was shyt; Bonum's horse and cart looked like those of

Charles Bonum sworn, testified: I live about a half a mile from Mr. Harper; he came to my house the night he was shot; I came up to town with him next morning; when we came to the spot where he had been shot, he said "This is the place;" we got out and measured the tracks; Peter lives near the Fishers that done the shooting; the Fishers have been killing stock around my neighborhood for some time.

D. C. Williams sworn, testified: I heard the report of the gun; I went out and found that the dog had been killed; I saw Peter Lee run into the woods, after it had been killed, about thirty yards ahead of me; both Lee and the Fishers claimed the dog; I saw the Fishers last winter with the dog: Wm. Fisher said if any man killed his dog he would kill him; he further said that all the dogs belonged to him.

Polly Kornegay sworn, testified: I heard of Mr. Harper being shot the night after it was done; I saw the Fishers pass my house on Friday, near sundown; they both had guns in their hands; they spoke to me; I am sure it was them.

Wm. Kelly sworn and testified: I was at home on Friday when Mr. Harper was shot; I saw the Fishers pass my house going towards the Sound Railway; they both had guns; it was near sundown; I am sure it was Friday evening; I did not suspicton anything on account of their having guns until next morning when I heard Mr. Harper had been shot, then I thought strange

Alfred Kornegay sworn and testified: I do not know the dog that was shot; I did not see the dog last February; the dog that was with me that day was not the one that the Fisher's claim belonged to me; my dog had a long tail and not a stub tail.

A. H. Morris sworn and testified: I arrested John Fisher on a warrant from 8. Van Amringe, J. P.; I found one gun in John Fisher's house and one in Wm. Fisher's house; (the guns were produced and examined in Court, there were squirrel shot in one and buck shot in the other.)

John D. Spicer sworn and testified to Peter Lee's character as being good; I have seen dogs with Peter; I never have seen him have one with a short tail.

F. D. Smaw sworn and testified: I have known Peter Lee for nineteen years; his

Thomas Weeks sworn and testified: I have known Peter Lee for several years; his character is good.

At the conclusion of the testimony the Justices delivered their judgment, discharging the defendant Peter Lee from the custody of the law, and binding the defendants, Wm. Fisher and John Fisher over to the next term of the Superior Court in the sum of one each. In default of the required bail the defendants, Wm. and John Fisher were committed to jail.
