vindicate the Board of Commissioners, Wilson al-At a meeting of the Board of Com missioners held October 15th, 1874, as appears by the Records to be found in the office of the Register of Deeds, Book 'C," page 233, the contract was awarded to me, my bid being less than that of Mr. Bishop. The work was entered upon, and running through a period of seven months, with the assistance of Mr. Alfred Lind, the matter of transcription or copping was fully and entirely completed, as per contract, any statements of Jas. Wilson to the contrary notwithstanding. The proof of this statement is on the face of the records, and an inspection being sufficient to satisfy any one of the facts, James Wilson always excepted.

He states that the work is incomplete. The book have never been pronounced complete, and have never been handed over by the contractor to the Board as complete. The statement is worth noth-

Wilson claims that there are thousands of abbre viations and many names spelled incorrectly. There are many abbreviations, but all of them are of Christian names, and the Christian names of males. Now, to say that it is annoying or troublesome to any man of common intelligence, to say nothing of the learned members of the bar, that such abbreviations are improper, or cause any an noyance to any one to read readily is sheer folly

always excepting Jas. Wilson. As to the spelling of proper names, every one of any cultivation knows that there is no rule by which to be guided, and in making a copy of an instrument the original should be followed strictly. The correction, which is the last work to be per formed, has not been completed, nor has it been ontended to have yet been con

As far as the work has proceeded it has been per ormed well and carefully. The colloquy which took place between me and Jas. Wilson was, stripped of verbiage, a baseless, unfounded, unsustained reflection on me as a gen tleman and an honest man, and an unsustained at tack upon the Beard of Commissioners, which was censured severely by the Board's refusal to adopt

These unfounded charges which were made, were nade with reference to the work performed by contract, to wit, the Index Books.

Now, this man has sought to impress the Board

and community that I altered a check drawn for \$359 in my favor to \$250. So far from such state ments being true, the facts must impress any one that some motive other than the public good, and a direct intent to injure my reputation, actuated this man to make the charge.

direct intent to injure my reputation, actuated this man to make the charge.

On or about the 17th of May I put before the Anditing Committee a bill sworn to by me for an instalment, to wit, \$350. This bill was, at the request of the Committee, withdrawn, after it had been audited and the warrants made out for that amount. The reason for withdrawal was that that included the balance of contract money, and they desired me to make the bill for \$250. Pursuant to their desire the bill was destroyed and the one substituted for \$250 was andited, warrant drawn, and Register of Deeds requested (in connection with a hundred other warrants) to draw an order for the amount—\$250. The Register having drawn the warrant for \$350 instead of \$250, himself made the alteration.

The course pursued by me to secure my instalment—\$250—was the proper, legal manner of procedure. That Jas. Wilson did not desire the warrant to be drawn amounted to nothing, his objection being made a nullity by the action of the Auditing Committee, by which the bill was audited, there being no other nor any higher power in the county for passing on the claim against the county. The action of the Board in approving the report of the Auditing Committee, in which this bill was fully and clearly set out, was proper and legal. The action of the Board in directing the Chairman protempore to sign the one hundred warrants of which this \$350 was see, was proper and legal. The action of the Auditing Committee, money order book of the Register of Deeds, all of which may be found in the office of the Register, and the bank statement of the business of the 9th of June, 1875.

These are the facts, fully recited, and the means indicated for preving the same. Yet in the face of all this, this man Wilson, on account of personal spite, ostensibly because I did not show him the "courtesy," as he calls it, of waiting upon him to attend to the business of the county for which he was elected, and which he neglects, to attend to duties in New York for seven months; which he ne

If he manufactures one, for there can be none other than such as he may manufacture, I will make him recant or prove him an incorrigible falsifier.
