Cart found in use within the City limits without the Badge or Registered Number as required by City Tax Ordinance passed May 9th. 1878, shall be subject to action by the City Marshal, and the owner thereof subject to a fine of Five Doznans for each and every day the same is used in this City without the prepayment of the mentally tax, or without having on the

Badge or Registered Number as the Ordinance of the City requires.
