COTTON STATES CONGRESS. Distinguished Men Present—Eloquent Addresses—The Cotton States Congress Welcomed to North Carolina and to Raleigh—The Objects and Aims of the Congress.

FIRST DAY'S SESSION. At 11 o'clock, Tuesday, the President, Col. D. E. Butler, of Georgia, called the Congress to order. In the absence of the Secretary, Messrs. R. Fulghum, J. D. Whitford and Johnston Jones were elected Secretaries of the meeting.

Dr. Maxwell, of Tennessee, responded to Mr. Busbee in behalf of the Congress. On motion, Gov. Brogden and Mayor Separk, of the city of Raleigh, were invited to seats on the floor, and these gentlemen acknowledged the compliment in befitting terms.

NIGHT SESSION. The following order of business was reported and adopted: 1st. Report of committee on constitution and by laws, of which J. L. Bridgers is chairman.

12. Miscellaneous business. The regular order of business was deferred and miscellaneous business was entered into. The Congress decided to hold its next regular annual session at Nashville, Tennessee, at such time as the President shall appoint.

Decrease of Exports. A statistical abstract of the foreign trade of the United States shows a decrease of \$67,000,000 in the currency value of the exports of domestic produce during the first eleven months of the fiscal year 1874-75.

Deaths. — Newbern Nat Shell: At a meeting of a number of one of the old Boards of City Council of this city, held Monday evening at the jail, resolutions were adopted informing the Board of Aldermen that it is their intention to "hold over," and authorizing ex-Mayor Campbell to demand of said Board of Aldermen a full surrender of their offices, seal, property, books, monies, etc., belonging to said city. TEMPLE OF ISRAEL—LAYING THE CORNER STONE.

The ceremony of laying the corner stone of the new Jewish synagogue, the handsome structure now in course of erection at the corner of Fourth and Market streets, will take place this (Thursday) afternoon, at 5 o'clock.
