NAVIGATING THE AIR.

The Schroeder Combination of Air-Ship and Balloon-Machinery for Propulsion and Steering-What the Inventor Expects to Accomplish.

W. F. Schroeder, whose novel invention in the shape of an air ship, asserted to be entirely under the control of its engineer, has been mentioned in the Tribune recently, was in this city yesterday exhibiting his model and drawings and consulting with engineers.

The great obstacle to success in aerial locomotion heretofore has been the rotary tendency of the balloon, which, so long as only one motor was employed, was an insuperable difficulty.

The machinery will be operated by a very light, strong hydraulic engine of about eight-horse power, to be built especially for the purpose.

The balloon will hold about 80,000 cubic feet of gas, and still allow all needed room for expansion; but to provide against a possible lack of gas, a gas generator of large capacity will be kept on board to keep up a constant supply.

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Immediately after Mr. Schroeder's return to Baltimore the contract will be let by him and George W. Gail.
