COUNTY COMMISSIONERS.

Synopsis of the Proceedings. A called meeting of the Board of County Commissioners was held yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock; present: Chairman Willis, and Commissioners Wagner, Morris, VanAmringe and Nixon.

Whereas, section 9, paragraph 6, of the act known as the machinery act requires every cashier and treasurer of any corporation or association to furnish a list of its stockholders resident in the several counties of this State, with the amount of cash on the first of April in each year to the county commissioners of the county in which such depositor or stockholder resides; and whereas, C. S. Ellis, Treasurer of the Real Estate and Loan Association, Richard J. Jones, Treasurer of the Wilmington Gas Light Company, Walter G. McRae, Treasurer of the Wilmington Building Association and C. S. Ellis, Treasurer of the Mechanics' Building Association, have been respectively notified to comply with the act so made and provided, and they have failed to comply with said act.

A communication from a prisoner in the county jail, accusing one of the watchmen with drunkenness, neglect of duty, &c., was ordered to be laid on the table.

The Chairman reported that he had advertised for bids for the repairs of Smith's Creek Bridge and the construction of a new bridge over Green's mill pond, upon which Duncan Holmes having put in the lowest bid for the construction of said work, the contract was awarded to him for the sum of \$115.
