NOON REPORTS.

The O'Connell Centenary — Dispatch Received from the Pope — The Toasts — Brilliant Illumination, &c.

DUBLIN, July 6.

The banquet last night, given by the Lord Mayor of Dublin in honor of the memory of O'Connell, was a brilliant affair. A dispatch was received from the Pope giving blessings to all persons assisting at the centenary celebration. The health of the Pope was proposed first and the Queen's health next. The toasts were received with loud cheers.

The toast to the memory of O'Connell was responded to by a grandson of the Liberator and by the Archbishop of Mitchell, who said that England was once under the government of France and yearned for deliverance from them. It was strange that Ireland should now turn to home government as did England of old days.

In consequence of illness of his daughter, Lord O'Hagan's address will be read to the people by the Lord Mayor of Dublin, after the procession passes through the streets, from the platform erected on the site intended for a monument to the memory of the Liberator.

The city was brilliantly illuminated last night and thronged with people.

At Philadelphia, one child is dead and ten sick from eating stale sausages. A dog ate some and died, and the sausage maker and stockkeeper have been arrested.

At Minneapolis, the National Educational Association adopted resolutions against the use of public lands for the benefit of corporations and sections, and urged Congress to provide better facilities for the Bureau of Education.

The boiler of a steam threshing machine on Ben Harlan's farm, in Murray County, Tenn., exploded Friday, killing Harlan, his engineer and a colored man. Seven others were wounded, two of whom will probably die.

WASHINGTON.

Commission of Wells Signed — The Yellow Fever — Cases at Fort Barrancas — Arrest of an Embezzler — The Money Count in the Treasury.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 6.

The President has signed the commission of J. P. Wells as District Attorney vice Fisher.

The following has been received from General Braxton, at Fort Barrancas:

"No new cases of yellow fever since the 2d. Assistant surgeon H. E. Brown has arrived. Dr. Sternberg is reported by his physician as convalescing. This morning there are forty-five cases under treatment, twenty-nine convalescent."

Mal. Wm. H. Johnson, Paymaster, has been relieved from duty in the Department of the Gulf."

The Bay of Fundy will collect 34 cents per ton on all vessels entering the port of Regency to defray the expense of the light house at Cape Bon.

The Revenue Department has advised of the arrest of C. B. Wilkinson, collector of the sixth district of Missouri, charged with conspiracy in signing false certificates, and conspiring to defraud the Government. He has been suspended, and ball fixed at \$15,000. Indemnity \$2,000.

The Committee appointed by Bristow to examine accounts and count the money in the Treasury, have reported a total deficit of \$47,877, deducting \$47,007 stored from the cash room July 2d, to which the Committee furnish no claim.

NEW YORK.
