CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION.

Summary of Proceedings.

SIXTH DAY.

RALEIGH, N. C., Sept. 11. Mr. Durham moved that Capt. Jarvis be made temporary President during the session, to act only in the absence of the President. Judge Tourgee objected, when Capt. Durham withdrew the motion.

Among the large number of ordinances introduced by Conservatives Mr. Hassel, of Martin, introduced an ordinance providing for the abolition of the township system and a restoration of the Courts of Pleas and Quarter Sessions. Mr. Singletary, an ordinance providing for the appointment by the General Assembly for each county an equal number of Magistrates as those elected and the Magistrates to elect from their body three County Commissioners. Mr. Marshall, a resolution requiring the prepayment of poll tax as a qualification for voting, and Mr. Vaughan, an ordipance forever prohibiting intermarriage with the races.

The ordinances introduced by the Republicans were two by Dr. Wheeler, of Forsyth, one providing that a Convention should not be called without submitting the question to the people, and one to make the homestead a fee simple.

The calendar was reached and disposed of by the reference of two or three resolutions in reference to contested seats to the Committee on Privileges and Elections, and the defeat of lke Young's sine die resolutions
