ROBINSON.—On Thursday, 9th Sept., 1875, at his fam'ly homestead, near Elizabeth, Eladen county, N. C., Thomas A., second son of the late Dr. Heman H. Robinson.

It is sad for the aged, whom years have deprived of strength and whom misfortunes have robbed of pleasure, to die; it is sadder still for those whom hope has deserted but to whom memory continues to tender a cordial grasp, to die; but it is saddest of all for those whem life has scarcely introduced to its varied, shifting scenes, to bid adien to the sunny hours of youth, and to be consigned to the dreaty, lonely years of the grave. Yet among the last was Thomas A. Robinson, He died at an age, when most men are just commencing life in earnest; he died, leaving the comforts of home; he died, withdrawing from the society of relatives and friends.

Though a mere boy, when Fort Sumpter's thundering cannon marshaled the chivalry of the South, he was among the very first to respond to that call, among the very last to look upon the torn pennons, that had waved among the ploughed hills and bloodstained valleys of Virginia. And the gray jacket of the Carolina soldier boy has been too scon exchanged for the white shroud woven by the cold blasts of Virginia's chilly winds: for the toils of the soldier broke the constitution of the man.

For many months Mr. Robinson was an invalid, receiving the best medical skill and the most attentive nursing; but prescriptions and attendance could not save him. He was watched, was guarded over, was attended to, with a solicitude that spoke of the affection of his family. But in vain. God said, "I made him; he is Mine."

On Saturday, to the burial ground, where many of his race lay, Tommie Robinson was borne—was borne by relatives who loved him for his confiding, his frank, his affectionate nature; who remembered his patience during his long suffering; and who were consoled by the knowledge that he was prepared to die. He had said: "I don't wish to leave you, but, if God so orders, I am willing."
