NOON REPORTS.

TURKEY, SERVIA AND BOSNIA.
The Porte and Consular Mediation—Railway Construction—Forty-Eight Thousand Turkish Troops on the Bosnian Frontier.

LONDON, Sept. 21.

A special Dispatch from Berlin to the Times says the port is endeavoring to impress on foreign powers the necessity of fixing a date for the termination of consular mediation in the insurgent camps.

The Turkish government, in view of possible military requirements, has ordered the construction of the Sophia Niisch and Banjaluka railway to be pushed with the utmost dispatch.

A telegram to the Times from Vienna expresses the opinion that now the Turks have had time to occupy in force the Bosnian frontier, the chances of renewing the insurrection in Bosnia have vanished.

The Daily News correspondent telegraphs that the Turks now have a force of forty-eight thousand men concentrated on the frontier of Servia.

NEW YORK.

Houston, Sept. 20.—The greatest distress prevails among poor people at the east end of Galveston. Several hundred have been rendered utterly destitute by the storm. They need help immediately.

"A committee of relief has been organized to help the sufferers, with the Mayor of Galveston at its head. Contributions are now being received, can you help them?"

GALVESTON, Sept. 20.—The greatest suffering prevails here among the poorer classes, and many of the wealthier people are in distress. Persons at the east end have been washed out of their houses, their clothing lost and provisions destroyed. Help is needed now; half to a dollar.

FRANCE.

Proposed Abolition of Departmental Voting—Overthrow of the Ministry Predicted—The Carlists.

PARIS, August 21.

The Courier de France states that the branch Cabinet has unanimously resolved to propose the abolition of the system of voting by departments. The Courier anticipates in consequence the overthrow of the ministry in November.

It now seems that only eight hundred Carlists have entered France and they by the Jura valley.

MISSOURI.

National Railroad Convention—Distressing News from Texas—The Town of Indiana Destroyed.

ST. LOUIS, Sept. 21.

The Committee appointed to arrange for holding a National Railroad Convention here on November 23d, have authorized their President to issue an address and appoint the necessary sub-committees.

Superintendent Clewsy, of the W. U. Telegraph Company, communicates to General Austin Stowe as follows:

"The steamer A. Morgan has just arrived at Galveston and reports that the town of Indiana, Texas, is almost entirely destroyed. The light-houses, wharves and nearly every house have been swept away, and one hundred to one hundred and fifty lives lost. The steamer could find no place to land her cargo."

Additional accounts from Galveston of the Indiana disaster say: "The loss of life and suffering is terrible. Dead bodies are strewn along the beach. Citizens here are organizing for their relief. Over one hundred bodies had been found and buried up to the time the steamer left." Telegraph manager Samson is reported safe, but the office and lines are gone.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.

Attack of a Fifty Year Old Husband on His Wife—Insanity from Jealousy—Meeting of Houston Boardholders.

NEW YORK, Sept. 21.

Prof. James Garland, a musician of New Brunswick, N. J., aged 50, whose wife is but a few years younger, and who had been married 20 years, from insane jealousy struck her in the head twice in the presence of her daughter, then shot himself, cut his throat and crushed his head with a hammer. The wife may recover.

A meeting of holders of bonds of the city of Houston, Texas, representing two hundred thousand dollars, was held to-day to take action upon the non-payment of interest, but no conclusion was reached.

POUGHKEEPSIE, Sept. 21.

Several horses at the driving park are affected by a disease similar to epizootic. It seems to concentrate in the throat, causing much distress. Reports from the interior of the State represent that the disease has broken out in several towns.

GERMANY.

An Editor Imprisoned—Death of Prince Adelbert, etc.

BERLIN, Sept. 21.

The Municipal Court of Berlin has sentenced the editor of *Germannus*, an Ultramontane journal, to 5 months' imprisonment for having published an article inciting the Chancellor and inciting disobedience of the laws.

Prince Adelbert, uncle of the King of Prussia, is dead. He was born in 1828.

Admiral Sir St. Peterborough announces that the Russian General Koutouzov repudiated Khokhlov on the 16th inst., without resistance. The greater portion of the Russian troops remained in a fortified camp outside. All Russian prisoners have been delivered over to General Kaufmann and the Khan has accepted all the conditions of peace.

The penalty is two thousand dollars fine or three years hard labor, or both, at the discretion of the court. His lawyer is Judge Fisher, late United States District Judge.

Marcus S. Hopkins, Examiner-in-Chief of the Patent Office, has resigned.
