THE STATE UNIVERSITY.

The Raleigh News says that "the first session of the new life of the University has been an encouraging one, and promises healthy and vigorous life. In truth, the number in attendance was larger than could have been expected, because in September, when the exercises were opened, most young men had already entered institutions whose sessions commenced earlier in the season. There is no question that the number of students will be largely increased next session, for the management so far has been wise and prudent."

The News is gratified that the experiment tried during the past session of boarding in mess for nine dollars per month each student "demonstrates that the University of North Carolina is one of the cheapest institutions in the country, and answers the objection that it would be too expensive for any but the sons of rich men. Chapel Hill, in truth, is no longer the place to which idle sons of wealthy fathers resort to vie with each other in extravagance."

Concerning the Presidency the News acknowledges it has no information, but infers "that the present financial condition of the University does not yet justify the appointment of a President with the large salary required to secure the necessary high talent, qualifications and influence. The appointment is still deferred to a future day, and in the meantime, the Chairman of the Faculty will at present perform the functions of President."

We regret that the Trustees at their recent meeting did not see fit to allow the publication of more facts in regard to the progress made in restoring the University. Great and general interest is felt in the work.
