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THE ALABAMA RADICALS.

Spencer's Crow Repudiated and Put to Flight. — Monday, Jan. 27. — A movement which has been going on since the late anti-Spencerian election...

— The Alabama Executive Committee which he controls, and of which Mayer was once chairman, but never a member, originally consisted of twelve members.

— On the 25th of December it was increased to twenty-four, in compliance with the demands of the party, and then a new chairman, McAfee, was elected.

— Mayer and McAfee both claimed to be chairman, and both issued calls for the committee to meet in this city on the 24th instant.

— They called a State convention for the 24th to select a State ticket and delegates to the National Convention. McAfee had more than two-thirds of the number elected as State committee in December, and had the most prominent Republicans in the State, such as ex-Governor Smith, ex-Congressman Beckley, Gen. Burke, and General State Senators and Representatives.

— This committee, called a convention for May 16, and met at Spencer's, and his followers as disorganizers, and will officially expose them at Washington by a committee appointed for that purpose.

— The Hon. M. T. Hauer, of Virginia, has addressed a letter to Representative Lamar, of Mississippi, in earnest advocacy of government aid to the Texas and Pacific railway scheme.

— He refers to his former opposition while in the Congress of the United States to the adoption of such schemes as federal measures, but states that his old State rights doctrines, upon which he predicted his objection, have been modified, and that on no one subject have they been modified more than in regard to a trans-continental route through the Southern territory of the Union.

— The National Democratic Committee, by Special Dispatch to the Gazette, has issued a Washington, Feb. 3, 1876, the announcement of Senators Whyte, Wallace and Gordon on the Resident Democratic Committee was unauthorized, because no such committee has been appointed by Democratic Senators in caucus.

— The committee when appointed, will consist of five, and not three, one of whom will be Senator Stevenson of Kentucky. It is doubtful whether Senator Whyte will care to serve. The names of the Senate committee will be made known next Tuesday in the House caucus.

— Third-Class Mail Matter. — The Senate committee on post-offices has addressed a letter to the Postmaster General, for an exhibit of the receipts and expenses for third-class mail matter, and whether it is to the interest of the government to transport the third-class matter at the rates charged before the act of last March.
