ANOTHER SHELL RUBSTS NEAR THE PRESIDENTIAL CHAIR.

What Brother Orville Knows-A Perfeetly Diagraceful Record-He Admits Having Dabbled in Indian Traderships, Being Aided and Abetted by the President-Paid for Getting Contracts for a Baltimore Firm. [Special telegram to the Enquirer.]

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 9. The developments in the examination of Orville Grant, brother of the President, by the committee on the War Department Expenditures, exhibit a perfectly disgraceful record. He appears, by his own admissions, to have been dabbling in Indian traderships and making money out of them, being aided and abetted in his operations by the President himself. He admitted also getting a regular salary from a Baltimore firm for getting them contracts.

This new scandal is making a marked sensation. The worst about Orville Grant is yet to come, and a number of witnesses are coming before the committee who will prove up transactions of which to day he pretended to be ignorant.

The committee of the House are doing a great deal of important work. Among other things, the safe burglary business is to be ventilated and probed. It is understood that some extraordinary developments will be L. Q. W.
