We are glad to note these retrenchments and hope they will be strictly carried out. The payment of the city bonds, amounting to \$44,700, that were issued to pay for the erection of the City Hall, became due the 1st of January last, and to pay these bonds a levy of 60 cents on the \$100 of value is made-for the sinking fund.

Among the most important of the additions and changes in the tax ordinance, as made by the Board, we find the following: kvery person buying or selling stock, either dead or alive, at wholesale, shall pay a tax of \$25 per month.

Cart houses shall be subject to a tax of \$5 per month. Every place, other than a livery stable, where horses, mules, cattle, carts, buggies or wagons are stabled or kept, shall be considered a cart house.

Commission merchants, whose sales are under fice (instead of ten) thousand dollars per month, shall pay \$5 per month; and when such monthly sales are five thousand and under ten thousand dollars, he shall pay \$7.50 per month.

Every person who shall sell or offer for sale in quantities in excess of three half pints any distilled, fermented liquors or wines, (except domestic wines) shall be deemed a liquor dealer. Rates remain the same as last year.

Dentists, physicians and surgeons are taxed \$25 per annum. Horse dealers are taxed \$10 per month,

instead of \$5 as formerly. Hotels are taxed the same as boarding.

Lawyers pay a license tax of \$50 per an-

Retail dealers in lager beer shall pay \$5 per month. This not to apply to retail liquor dealers. Wholesale dealers in malt liquors shall pay \$10 per month, subject to the same provision.

Peddlers of books (other than religious books or pamphlets) are taxed \$10 per month, and agents soliciting job printing The Smithville mails, by steamboat, close \$25 per month. at 8 A. M., daily, except Sundays.

Milk dealers are required to pay \$2 per month on each cart or wagon.

Section 4 provides that the taxes on real estate and personal property shall be due and payable the 15th day of June, 1876 and section 5 that the tax collector shall, from and after the second day of July, 1876, proceed to collect the taxes upon real estate and personal property that may then be due and remaining unpaid, by distress, as is provided by law.

C., That Coupons of the city bonds when the same shall be due and payable, shall be received by the City Treasurer in payment of assess-ments and city taxes, other than for month-ly license or business tax, and the coupons so received or redeemed, shall be allowed the City Treasurer in the settlement of his accounts. Any ordinance or parts of ordinances conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.
