[From the Atlanta (Ga.) Constitution.] The fall of "hominy" snow extended in Geargia below the middle of the State, taking in Augusta, Macon and Columbus. Farther south the sleet fell in the form of rain, and our visitors from the northwest probably got no further taste of the great storm than a cold rain and raw air. And yet there was sleet at Selma, Vicksburg and Jackson, but we hear of uo snow on the line of Savannah in this State. North of Atlanta the "hominy" soon became feathery particles that covered, on Monday morning, the upper part of South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama, with a white spring mantle, varying from two to eight inches in thickness. At Greenville, South Carolina, it was four inches deep; at Dalton, five inches, and at Decatur, Alabama, it. was six inches deep. About Charleston it is feared that the strawberry crop is injured, and there is little hope that the cherry, plum and peach blossoms in the upper sections of South Carolina, Georgia and Alabama have escaped serious injury. In Atlanta the mercury has been thus far this week twenty degrees lower than at any corresponding time of the last ten years. The snow covered every inch of Tennessee and of the States to the north of it. In some places it was nearly a foot deep, and extremely cold weather came with it. The fruit crop of Kentucky and Tennessee is ruined. In East Tennessee this is no inconsiderable loss. The dried fruit trade of Knoxville and its neighborhood alone aggregates well up towards half a million of dollars. At Nashville a depth of eight inches was attained, or more than has fallen in one storm for over thirty years. Throughout the States in which our northwestern visitors reside the cold and the snow were alike unprecedented, the lateness of the season being considered. The entire fruit crop of those States is also damaged, perhaps ruined. No part of the country in fact seems to have escaped the ravages of the storm. All along the coast, from Galveston to Maine, there was a terrible gale, and in the interior high winds, low temperature, and an unreasonable fall of snow or sleet. Nor was the storm confined to this country: Gales, floods and snow falls, one or all, were visited upon England, France, Germany and Belgium, last week. Earthquakes, shipwrecks and land slides were among the incidents of the European spell of bad weather. Our storm of show was hardly a full copy of the one that fall in England and Scotland, where the railroads were blockaded by the inconvenient and unseas malle sulfatance. 

We paid a visit to this institution a few days since, and found that Messrs. Mathes & Co. have not been idle since they determined to change their quarters. The location is certainly a great improvement on that of the old one and vastly more convenient for their business, while the material for making brick is much more abundant and of better quality. The Superintendent informs us that he is now able, in good weather, to turn out 24,000 brick per day. For this purpose he uses two of Gage's patent machines, one of which is worked by TO steam and the other by horse power.



The prison houses are strong and substantial, which is also the case with the stockade. On each of the four corners of the latter sentry boxes are being constructed, in which, during the day, while the convicts are at work, armed sentinels will be placed, the boxes being in such a position that each of, the guards can have an eye on two sides of the stockade at the same time, and which will render an escape on the part of a convict almost an impossibility. At night these sentries are relieved by a night watchman, the convicts then being all locked up.

At present there are twenty-nine convicts in the Work House, of which fourteen were received from the penitentiary, three from Columbus county, one from Wayne county, and the remainder (eleven) from New Hanover. Only two of these are females.
