The Raleigh Charter Case. [Raleigh News.]

At the time of this writing final action in the case which has occupied the attention of the court for two days had not been had; but it is so sufficiently foreshadowed as to make it clear that partisan interests have prevailed, and that the city of Raleigh is to be remanded back to the domination overthrown in the election of last May.

The action was originally commenced before Judge Watts in chamb r, on an application for relief in the shape of a mandamus prayed for by John C. Gorman and others, requiring the mayor to appoint registrars for the Eastern, Middle and Western Wards of the city under the former charter; to designate points in those Wards where the polls should be opened, and to appoint inspectors for these three Wards, and also to enjoin registrars from registering the voters of the city and from holding an election on the 1st day of May.

On the trial before Judge Watts, the defendants agreed to admit and submit to such principles as had been decided in the Wilmington city charter case, to be unconstitutional under the ruling of the Supreme Court, among which was the requirement of ninety days' residence, but on the others to stand on their de-

After argument the Judge granted the judgment prayed for, and the defendants took an appeal to the Supreme Court. In speaking of that appeal, we mentioned the prevalence of a rumor that after the judgment was signed, and just before Judge Watts left for Henderson county, he sent for the clerk, and when the deputy clerk went to his room he ordered him to issue the mandamus and injunction, notwithstanding the appeal, and threatened to put the clerk in jail unless it was done. As to the threats we know nothing, but the mandamus and injunction were issued and the appeal disregarded, and this brought the case up before Judge Henry.

After a prolonged argument on Tuesday, Judge Henry affirmed the decision of Judge Watts, with the indulgence of a farther answer to be put in by the defendants yesterday at 11 o'clock.

This case, confined to the affairs of a single city, is yet of interest to the whole State. It is one of the best commentaries upon Radicalism that could be made. The whole object of these legal (?) proceedings is to reinstate in power the mob that ruled this city with such detriment to its best interests. To reach this end the deliberate act of the Legislature is set aside. Even admitting the unconstitutionality of some of the features of the new charter-which we do not, though a Republican Supreme Court so agrees-there were enough saving features in that charter to have given

The Lillington Family-An Histori-

cal Relic. Mr. H. F. Waters, of Salem, Mass., in ooking over the old Essex county deeds, recently, found the following, which is contributed to the "Notes and Queries" of the New England Historical and Genealogical Register for April:

"I Alexander Lillington, of Albermarle county, in the province of Carolina, planter, and now present in Salem, in New England, being the husband of Sara James, the daughter of Thomas James, late of the s'd Carolina deceased; but formerly of Salem in New England, which s'd Sara is the only surving child and rightfull heire of ye s'd Tho: James:" &c., &c.

This deed was signed and sealed the 3d of August, 1675.

This incident, of which we doubt if there is any other authentic record in existence, carries us back in the history of the Lillington family one hundred years anterior to the time of Col. Alexander Lillington, who fought at Moore's Creek as Colonel of the 6th Continental Regiment, and who, in 1777, became a member of the House of Commons. There is little doubt that the Alexander Lillington referred to in the above extract from the New England magazine, was the grandfather or great-grandfather of the Alexander who figured in this section one hundred years later, who became so renowned in war and in the councils of his province. This being admitted we think this gives us the first insight into the ancestorial history of our Lillington.

At the time of which we write (1665) the territory which included the country between the Cape Fear River and Virginia, was called Albemarle County, from Gen. George Monk, afterwards Duke, of Albe marle, one of the proprietors, William Drummond being at that time Governor of the Colony.

The Approaching Memorial.

A friend suggests that in the arrangements for the approaching Memorial Day, provision be made for the closing of all places of business at twelve o'clock and the prompt moving of the procession at halfpast one. As this pleasant reunion occurs but once a year, we should certainly be able and willing to devote an entire afternoon to the ceremonies, whereas heretofore there has not been sufficient time, after the address, to visit and strew the flowers upon the graves of our fallen braves with that attention and respect which should characterize the bestowal of so touching and appropriate a tribute.


