WASHINGTON.

Waddell-Cassider Difficulty-Full and Authentic Particulars.

The Washington correspondent of the Baltimore Sun furnishes the following particulars of the difficulty which occurred at the Ebbitt House, in Washington city, on Saturday night last, between Hon. A. M. Waddell and J. J. Cassidey, of this city; WASHINGTON, May 14, 1876.

A week or two ago a paragraph appeared in the Wilmington, N. C. STAR stating that Congressman A. M. Waddell, while on a visit to Wilmington, on leave of absence, had caned one J. J. Cassidey, the editor of the Wilmington Post, on account of some articles published in the latter paper. The sequel of this caning affair is a matter loest to Washington. When his leave expired Mr. Waddell returned to Washington, and it seems that Cassidey came here also. Last night as the Congressman was passing through the office of the Ebbit House Cassidey followed him and with a heavy cane.was about to inflict a blow, when the Congressman's brother who was in the office, (but who was unknown to Cassidey,) seeing the belligerent movement, applied a cane vigorously to Cassidey's shoulders. Congressman Waddell hearing the melee, turned, and seeing his old Winnington antagonist, dealt him two or three blows which felled him to the floor. As Cassidey was getting on his legs again, Congressman Rusk, of Wisconsin, who was present, caught hold of Waddell and prevented him from inflicting further punishment This friendly act almost occa-siened a fight between Rusk and Waddell, until it was explained that Mr. R. had not the least interest in Cassidey, but that he only wanted to prevent a fight. When Cassidey regained his feet he seemed to be perfectly dazed, and a movement of his hand indicated the intention to draw a pistol, when Congressman Waddell's brother prevented it.
