DEATH OF THE EDITOR OF THE PRESBYTERIAN.

Died, at his residence in this city, at 7 o'clock last evening, of consumption, Rev. Thomas L. De Veaux, editor of the North Carolina Presbyterian.

Mr. DeVcaux was a native of South Carolina, where he first officiated as a minister of the Presbyterian church. He resided in Florida for several years, coming from that State to North Carolina about four years ago, He edited the North Carolina Presbyterian nearly four years, and had Le n a resident of Wilmington rearly half of that time. Owing to an affection of his throat and lungs, he had not preached in several years.

Mr. De Veaux was a writer of fine abilities, and with only a comparat vely short experience in the profession was yet one of the most accomplished journalists of our acquaintance. He had ripe judgment, great vigor, fondness for the varied details of the business of journalism as well as a penchant for writing. He could have edited a secular paper with the same ease and ability with which he conducted the Presbyterian. Previous to his death Mr. DeVeaux had been in steadily-declining health for more than two years, but up to within a few months had attended to his duties, going regularly to his office with hardly a day's intermission. The Presbyterian Church in North Carolina and Southern Presbyterian journalism sustain a heavy loss in the decease of this excellent man and

At the time of his death Mr. De Veaux was about forty years of age. He leaves a wife and one child. They have our truest sympathy in their sad bereavement.
