CANDIDATES FOR GOVERNOR.

On the Conservative side the names most prominently mentioned are ex-Gov. Z. B. Vance, of Mecklenburg; ex-Gov. David S. Reid, of Rockingham; Gen. Wm. R. Cox, of Wake; Hon. D. G. Fowle, of Wake; Hon. W. N. H. Smith, of Wake; Hon. J. M. Leach, of Davidson; Col. John A. Gilmer, of Guilford; Gen. A. M. Soales, of Guilford; Hon. R. B. Vance, of Buncombe; Montfort McGehee, Esq., of Person; Hon. John Manning, of Chatham; Hon. T. J. Jarvis, of Pitt.

On the Republican side the suggestions have been much fewer: Hon. Thomas Settle, of Guilford; Hon. Edwin G. Reade, of Person; Gen. O. H. Dockery, of Richmond; Col. Rufus Barringer, of Mecklenburg.

THE LEADING SOUTHERN PAPERS.

A number of the more influential Southern newspapers have indicated no preference for a candidate to be nominated by the Democratic National Convention. A larger number, however, have "named the man." In the latter class are the following, which include the very ablest of our journals: *Baltimore Gazette*, for Mr. Bayard; *Louisville Courier-Journal*, for Gov. Tilden; *Richmond Dispatch and Whig*, for Gov. Tilden; *Richmond Enquirer*, for Mr. Bayard; *Petersburg Index-Appal*, for Gen. Hancock; *Charleston News and Courier*, for Governor Tilden; *Augusta Constitutionalist*, for Governor Tilden; *Memphis Appeal*, for Governor Tilden. There are perhaps a dozen other journals of equal prominence, but of whose preferences, if they have been expressed, we are not aware. The *Nashville American* and the *Savannah Aves* appear to be decidedly opposed to Tilden's nomination. None of the preferences seem to be actuated by prejudice or personal considerations of any kind. The press of the South is singularly candid in declaring in favor of a truly representative man who shall be at the same time the most available nominee.

"FLESH AND SPIRIT."

Another "Odd Trump" novel! The fellow, for the author is evidently a man, turns out novels with astonishing rapidity. If he did his work crudely he would not be far from his stepping place, because people would tire of his wares, but he does no crude work. In the quality of exciting and sustaining the interest of his reader this "Great Unknown" has no superior among contemporaneous fiction authors. He rivets attention. He makes you wait more.

"Flesh and Spirit" is not a novel, but a romance of practical life. All the things related could not have happened just as they are told; indeed, many of them are clearly impossible. Coincidence after coincidence takes place. And the whole story of less than three hundred pages is a giddy whirl of incidents. There is no tedious description, and the conversation is more to the point than is usual. Indeed "Flesh and Spirit" is a marvel of condensed incident. The writer is a satirist of manners and speech, but he lets his characters do the biting, which is the more effective way. We do not "propose" to indicate the thread of the story. Mr. Skillet is the most humorous person in the book, and Rupert Grey is the most repulsive. Skillet is far too good and kind for a Wall street man. Darcy Gaston is a fine sample of "our immortal youth," and Helen Rathven is the impressive, candid, brave Southern girl. Such books as "Flesh and Spirit" do a service in correcting false impressions of Southern character. In the working out of character it is mostly true to nature.

THE CENTENNIAL.

Woman's Pavilion—Work of Southern Ladies.

The question of what woman can do is partly solved in this exhibition. At any rate, here we see she has made a pretty clock, has invented a life preserving mattress, the model of which you will find in a tank, with dolls personating the rescued ones; has contrived a lock barrel cover, and a most convenient work table. I was quite interested in a case of birds and animals sporting about a tree, specimens of worsted work. Look, too, at the beautiful carvings—some from the School of Design at Cincinnati, and a bedstead wrought by two young ladies. A model smoothing iron, heated by gas, and exhibited by a doll, must delight the youngsters; and in the next case a patent stocking and glove-darning, also displayed by dolls.

The art students of Cooper Union, New York, have sent beautiful specimens of execution and industry. There are also inlaid tables, pressed flowers, a beautiful fan with pearl sticks, and a scene called "Five Senses," consisting of figures in Watteau costume, painted on white silk. Quite a picture gallery invites inspection, but we can only glance at the largest, "Truth Unveiling Falsehood," for we wish to see Mrs. Greator's pen and ink sketches; and here is an odd thing—the thirteen primary forms of crystallization in mica, designed by a young lady. Sofa pillows and toilet cushions are such a drug at all fairs I did not intend to glance at one, but this embroidered affair is so superior to any I have ever seen, against my will I am constrained to stop.

WORK OF SOUTHERN WOMEN.

Another correspondent gives some interesting descriptions of the leading works of Southern women, as follows:

Miss Mary S. Riley, of Louisville, Ky., has a very beautiful and singular exhibition of portraits constructed of silk or worsted embroidery. Notwithstanding the apparently insuperable difficulties in this process in the way of securing delicate shading with such cumbrous and unmanageable materials, the artist has succeeded in several instances in producing work in black and white which, at a little distance, cannot be distinguished from etching. But the most ambitious and most interesting piece in the collection is a picture in worsted representing the "Battle of Langside, or the Death of Douglas in Defense of Mary, Queen of Scots." In the foreground is Douglas lying on the ground in his armor, with his charger near by, and his knights surrounding him. Queen Mary is bending over with a look of anxious solicitude, and a monk near by holds a cross to Douglas's lips. Above him spread the boughs of a large oak, and in the distance may be seen the smoke of battle. The deep green foliage of the trees, the rich velvet and silver garments of the knights and ladies, the bright trappings of the horses—even the deathly pallor and expression of agony on Douglas's face—all are brought out with almost as much clearness as if they had been painted.

Mrs. J. Whitmore, of Charleston, S. C., exhibits a large picture in worsted of Washington at Trenton.

Mrs. S. E. Anthony, of Smyrna, Del., has a handsome piece of worsted work in a variety of patterns, and Miss Susie Barton, of Prince George's county, Md., exhibits an excellent picture in tapestry.

There are also needlework and lacework from Annapolis, Frederick City and Mount Washington, Baltimore county; also from the Sisters of St. Joseph, at St. Augustine, Florida, and a cap, and a pair of mitts, made of milk weed, by Miss Rebecca C. Orren, of Kent county, Md.

The ladies of Jacksonville and St. Augustine, Florida, exhibit beautiful specimens of Florida moss, pincushions, Florida grasses and flowers, bouquets of ferns and hats of ocooca.

Miss Alan P. Smith, of Baltimore, exhibits a magnificent specimen of needlework in lilacs and violets, on pale lilac and white silk. It attracts great admiration. Miss Adams, also of Baltimore, has a carved and painted screen.

THE PRESBYTERIANS.

Notes of the Southern General Assembly—Distinguished Men.

The subject of representation in the Pan-Presbyterian Council was ably and elaborately discussed Saturday and Monday.

Among the delegates to this Assembly are several whose names are known and their influence felt throughout the entire land. Such are Judge Old, Gen. D. H. Hill, Rev. M. D. Hoge, D. D., and Rev. Stuart Robinson, D. D.

Judge Old has for many years been a distinguished member of the bar in Richmond, Va., and during the war was Confederate Commissioner of Exchange of Prisoners.

Gen. D. H. Hill served in the Confederate army throughout the late war, and, since its close, has been an active writer and vindicator of Southern principles. As a member of the Southern Historical Society, and contributor to the *Southern Magazine*, he is well known in literary circles.

Rev. M. D. Hoge, D. D., was Moderator of the General Assembly which met last year in Louisville, Ky., and is pastor of a large and flourishing church in Richmond, Va. Numerous attempts have been made to draw him off to other fields of labor, but his devotion to his charge is equalled only by the admiration conferred upon him by all denominations in the city where he wields such boundless influence. Catholics have united with Protestants in their expressions of confidence and esteem.

Dr. Hoge started life as a teacher, in which avocation he quickly achieved reputation. Though still but middle-aged, he is generally regarded as one of the greatest expositors of his church in the South. He preached yesterday morning at the Independent Presbyterian Church to a very large congregation, and in the afternoon addressed the various Sunday schools of the city, assembled in the lecture room of the same church.
