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



A Memorial Tablet.





IN CONFORMITY WITH THE PROVISIONS of a law, entitled "An act for the preservation of the public health, by establishing suitable Quaran-tine Regulations for the Port of Wilmington," the undersigned hereby gives notice to Pilots, Masters and owners of vessels, and to all persons concerned, that the following Quarantine regulations will be in force from and after June 1st, 1876. Ist. All vessels from ports south of Cape Fear, will come to at the visiting station, New Deep W₂-ter Point, and await the inspection of the Quaran-tine Physician. tine Physician. 2d. All vessels or boats of any character having sickness on board on arrival, or having had sickness

sickness on board on arrival, or having had sickness any time during the voyage, are required to come to at the station for inspection, without regard to the port from which they sailed. 3d. Vessels not included as above will proceed to Wimington without detention. 4th. Pilots are especially enjoined to make care-ful enquiry, and if hot satisfied with the statements of the Captain, or if the vessel is in a filthy condi-tion, they will bring the vessel to at the Station for further examination.

5th. Pilots wilfully violating the Quarantine laws are subject to forfeiture of their branches; masters of vessels to a fine of two hundred dollars a day for every day they violate the Quarantine laws, and all other persons liable for each and every offence.



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
