Wheeler-His Record.

A Plattsburgh correspondent of the New York Sun gives the following antecedents of Wm. A. Wheeler:

In 1846 or 1847 Mr. Wheeler, then as now an aspirant for political preferment, was known as a Whig. Notwithstanding this fact he obtained the Democratic nomination for District Attorney by pledging his word in the strongest terms to several of the leading Democrats of Malone and its vicinity that he would then and thereafter act with their party. The Whigs, unsuspecting his party fidelity, were influenced to nominate Mr. Wheeler also. Whereupon he went back on his Democratic friends and his pledge, and even desied the promise that was hardly cold on his lips. This denial, however, was met and sufficiently contradicted by the affidavits of several gentlemen who had been privy to the violated com-

As another evidence of Mr. Wheeler's inflexible integrity, I am told that when a member of the Assembly he was employed by Mr. Federick Ames, of Essex county, to purchase on account of said Ames a piece of State land, located near the State prison at Dannemora. On looking into the matter, Mr. Wheeler decided that there was money in the speculation, and that he could find more profit in buying the land as principal than as agent. He connseled with one Donglass, a clerk in his law office at Malone, and the twain became possessed of the land, which was purchased in Douglass'

When Mr. Ames found, upon application at the Land Office, that the plum had been picked by a certain Douglass, he went to the Hon. Mr. Wheeler to inquire why and wherefore. Mr. Wheeler insisted that it was all a mystery to him, and that he didn't know much about Douglass, but understood that he was half lawyer, half horse jockey, and lived in

The true inwardness of the transac ion came out afterward in court during the trial of a suit brought by this same Douglass against the Hon. William A. Wheeler, his partner in the land speculation, to compel him to divide the profits. Mr. Ames appeared as a witness, and his testimony put Mr. Wheeler in such a light that the latter hastened to compromise the suit by paying Douglass his share and the costs.

Of course, nobody can tell how Mr. Wheeler's reputation for integri-ty will be supported by the investigation of Northern Pacific affairs. Mr. Wheeler was Chairman of the House committee on this railroad. and if he, like Blaine and Colfax, should have to walk the plank, it will at least be a crumb of comfort to his friends to know that the Hon. A PUT UP JOB.

The Caldwell Di patch Fixed up in Washington. [Special telegram to the Enquirer.]

WASHINGTON, June 19. Proctor Knott proves to have been exactly right when he said that he suspected the Caldwell dispatch vindicating Blaine to be "a fixed up job." It is showed to-day to the Judiciary Committee that the dispatch was prepared on this side, word for word, and sent over to Caldwell to be returned to Mr. Knott. It is clear from the congratulatory letters of the defeated aspirants to Gov. Hayes that each one is as much pleased as if he had been nominated himself. Mr. Blaine was so prompt and fervid in his telegraphic shaking of hands with his successful competitor that his leading organ in this State has already suggested him for a place in the cabinet of Gov. Hayes. If he is to be the "power behind the throne," the people will be likely to investigate his merits as fully as if he had been nominated for "the throne itself," and, in that event, Gov.
