Colorado Senator-Existence of Vulcan confirmed-Indian outrages in Texas-Decision in Distiller's Tax

WASHINGTON, Oct. 3. The result in Colorado will bring Mr. Chaffee, another of the Jones-Sharon class,

to the Senate.

A special from Paris says the existence of Vulcan is confirmed. Texas advices say twenty-five Indians struck the Neuces river on the 28th ult., swept down the Sabine river, below Trio city, attacking the ranches and chief camps, and killing three whites and several Mexicans, and are now passing out up the Neuces river, in the direction of Fort Clark, with over one hundred head of horses. Citizens and soldiers are in pursuit. This party has committed more devil-

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POREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

The Rustern War-The Porte's Excuse for Resisting the Demands of the Powers-Austria's Attitude as to the Proposal of Russia-Turkey Hepresented to be Willing to Grant an Armistice at the Suggestion of England-spain and the United States, LONDON, Oct. 4.

The "Therapia" correspondent of the Times, in a letter of September 26th, says : "The Porte grounds its resistance to the demands of the Powers on its alleged inability to crush the passions of the mob. Its ultimatatis is a threat of the massacre of Christians. Turkish Ministers allege that they are constantly receiving anonymous letthey are constantly receiving anonymous let-ters, and that placards are placed at every corner of Stamboul, threatening popular vengeance on the government if they ac-cept conditions incompatible with the dig-nity of the Empire. Shrewd persons are inclined to believe that the menaces are prearranged by the government itself, but many European residents, and even some of the diplomats, especially Mr. Elliot, British Ambaassador, are disquieted by them." The Times' Berlin dispatch says the Turkish Cabinet is understood to have declared that it cannot be expected to endorse the programme concerning which such differences exist among the Powers themselves.
