ANOTHER CHARGE AGAINST HAYES. As public journalists we are determined to perform no sordid work.

In August last the New York World charged that Gov. Hayes had written a letter in which he expressed his sympathy with the principles of the "American Alliance."

At a conference of the Grand Council of the United States of the American Alliance, held at Philadelphia July 4th and 5th, 1876, the following resolutions were adopted.

On the 5th of July a committee of the American Alliance Conference called upon Governor Hayes and was received. The chairman, Mr. Lamb, of Ohio, informed Governor Hayes of his nomination.

And this is your model Reformer. This is the firm, decided, consistent man who cannot be moulded to suit Chandler, Morton and Cameron.

Here is what the Democrats mean by retrenchment and reform. The "Ex-Confederate House," as Republican editors rejoice in calling that august body, of which Jim Blaine was once Speaker and Ben Butler was a member.

Can Hayes afford to be silent? How will the foreign-born citizens of the United States, relish the idea of electing an "honorary member" of an association with such principles as the above sets forth?

The New York Herald is supporting Hayes for President. What, it says, to the colored voters of the South may be received as coming from an ally, and may, therefore, be considered without suspicion of fear.

So in South Carolina, General Hampton, one of the foremost citizens of the State, for years past has been elected Governor, if he is chosen Governor, he will exercise impartial justice between white and black, and see that the colored people are secure in all their rights in every part of the State.

There is no good reason—none that will bear the touchstone of careful analysis—why the colored voters of the entire South should not support the party of Reconstruction, Retrenchment and Reform.

South are identical. Prosperity can not visit on without visiting the other. Every colored man of intelligence knows that during the long, wearying, saddening season of financial prostration through which the country has passed, and is still passing, all have had to suffer.

Next Tuesday the Republicans of Indiana will be engaged in "beating the dust out of a pair of blue jeans."

The Boston Post has a startling story from Washington to the effect that in case Ohio is carried by the Democrats next week, Hayes' name is to be withdrawn and Ulysses S. Grant substituted as the Republican candidate for President.

We advise the colored voters in the Southern States to support the Democratic State and local tickets. They will probably, in general, want to vote for Governor Hayes, and this they can easily do at the same time that they vote for the Democratic local and State tickets.

After traveling over the various Southern States, Dr. Redfield, correspondent of the Cincinnati Commercial, concedes them all to Tilden except South Carolina, with aggregate majority of 315,000.
