As this terrible disease is prevailing to some extent in this city and elsewhere, we publish the following from a correspondent of observation and experience, with the hope that it may be tried with benefit to the afflicted:

MR. EDITOR:-In the cause of suffering humanity, I beg that you will, publish the following prescription, which I know from experience is most beneficial in that terrible disease, which is so prevalent through out the country at this time:

10 drops tincture Belladenna, 11 de Phytolaca, the juice of the common poke root, each in a half tumbler of rain water. Give the patient one teaspoonful every half hour, if lever is very high, for the first four hours, then one every hour for next twelve hours, then one every two hours while the disease continues. Use no gargles or swabs for the throat, but an outward application of soft oil or lard may be

In about fifty cases that have come under my observation and that have been treated as above, not more than three have proved fatal.
