WASHINGTON, Feb. 20, 1 A. M. The House galleries were crowded yesterday with interested spectators as the two Houses met to receive the decision of the Electoral Commission upon the vote of Louisiana. The protests presented by Hon. Randall Gibson, of Louisiana, and Wallace, of Pennsylvania, were strongly drawn.

The Senate debate was marked by excellent speeches from Thurman, Stevenson, Wallace, and Bayard against the decision. John Sherman spoke with the most effect on the other side. He and Sargent, of California, were especially abusive and

The most striking feature of the day's proceeding was the absence of Mr. Conkling. Every one remarked upon it. It certainly indicates his disgust with the decision of the tribunal and his unwillingness to be bound by it. A strong party pressure was brought to bear to keep him away from the Senate.

The Republicans are actively intriguing for Cabinet positions. It is generally thought that none of the present Cabinet will be retained. Evarts is to be Secretary of State, it he pleases. Stanley Matthews, of Ohio, is to go in if he desires. Pool, of North Carolina; Josh Hill, of Georgia; Key, of Tennessee, and Alcorn, of Texas, are spoken of for the South. Early History of the Cape Fear.


