4th. That at the several polling places in said State there were stationed U. S. Deputy Marshals, appointed under the provisions of sections 2021 and 2022, U. S. Revised Statutes, which provisions were unconstitu-tional and void. That said deputy mar-shals, exceeding over one thousand in aum-ber, by their unlawful and arbitrary action, in obedience to the improper and illegal in-structions received by them from the De-partment of Justice, so interfered with the full and free exercise of the right of suffrage by the duly qualified voters of said State that a fair election could not be and was not held in said State on November

5th. 
