If this division continues, and these Senate leaders make a factions personal war on Hayes' nominations, he will be largely dependent upon Democratic Senators for support.

I have already stated that it is the intention of the Democratic Senators to make no factious war on the Administration, but to support all good nominations and all acts of the 1dministration, which shall be found to be right and judicious. President Hayes' position is exceedingly critical and a wavering policy would ruin him. I am informed by friends who have seen him that he means well, and is very anxious to restore peace and good will between the North and the South. The danger is that he will be driven from this purpose by the opposition and influence of the Republican extremists. They are bending every nerve to control him and keep him in the old party lines. The majority of Democratic politi-cians believe that this effort will be successful, and that Hayes will finally succumb to the altras, though others

hope for better things. The Democratic Senators are to have an increase on the committees by reason of their increased strength in the body. 
