Strike of the Compositors on the Net York Tribune.

NEW YORK, June 29.

The Tribune has been in negotiation for a day or two with its compositors for a reduction from fortysix to forty cents, the abolition of "bogus" copy, and one or two minor points which brought them in conflict with the rules of the Typographical Union. This afternoon at 5 o'clock the whole force struck without notice. New men were instantly called in, and by 9 o'clock they had forty compositors at work. The paper comes out in the morning with ten pages, and the foreman says he can get on hereafter without difficulty, although they will want a few good printers.


