

Our Night Reports.

WASHINGTON.

The recent Order of the President relative to Federal Officers—How it is to be construed—Increase of Revenue from the Tobacco Tax, &c., &c.

WASHINGTON, July 6. The revenue from the tobacco tax has increased during the past few months \$1,250,000.

The Cabinet session to-day was mainly devoted to considering and formal discussion concerning the President's recent order prohibiting federal officers from participating in the management of political committees and conventions, with special reference to the question whether it should be enforced against certain officers who took part in the Iowa convention, and whether Postmaster General Key correctly interpreted the purpose of the order in his yesterday's letter to the Madison (Wis.) postmaster. No formal action was taken on the subject involved, but it was agreed that the letter of the Postmaster General was a correct and judicious statement of the meaning of the order in regard to cases like the one presented from Wisconsin, and that while the order should be firmly maintained and impartially enforced, there is no occasion to apply it to the Iowa officers, who were elected as members of the convention before it was issued, and who probably took their seats before it reached them by mail.

In the Cabinet letter accrediting Signor Matta as Minister from the Diaz government was read, and was the subject of considerable discussion. It was a friendly and pleasant document, but the contents received no further attention than a respectful listening, as it was not intended at present to take any action beyond a reference to the State Department, by which it was presented to the Cabinet.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

Serbian Neutrality to be Respected—No Importation Expected of Russian Arms Fully Prepared—Position for the Occupation of Bosnia by Austrian Troops—Work on Fortifications—1,500 Persons Perish from Hunger—Another Russian Defeat—The Liverpool Cotton Trade, &c.

A special dispatch from Vienna to the Daily Telegraph says: "The Roumanian government, before sending troops across the Danube, inquired how Austria would regard such a step, and was informed that as long as the Roumanian army respected Serbian neutrality, Austria would remain indifferent to its movements."

The Times' Bucharest dispatch says no important action is expected until the Russians have established depots of supplies on the southern side of the Danube and prepared everything for an advance.

The Times' Belgrade dispatch says: "The Greek and Roman armies of Bosnia are anxiously awaiting the result of their petition, asking for the occupation of Bosnia by Austrian troops. Part of the Mohammedi population also favor foreign occupation."

A special from Constantinople to the Daily News says: "Two thousand men have arrived from Smyrna to work on the fortifications." All the papers seem to confirm the news that the Turks are about to withdraw a greater part of their forces from Montenegro.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 6. Fifteen hundred persons, who were fleeing from Adler to the Turkish lines from fear of the Russians, perished from hunger. SMOLNA, July 6-10 A. M. A battle was fought yesterday in the vicinity of Biela, which lasted twelve hours. The Russians were repulsed with considerable loss and fell back on Sistova. No details.

LIVERPOOL, July 6. The circular of the Cotton Brokers' Association says: Cotton was quiet throughout the week, with a tendency to the close slightly favoring buyers. American cotton was in less general request and prices were reduced partially 1-16d on higher grades. Sen Island was in fair demand at steady prices. In futures a fair business was done with few fluctuations. Latest transactions show a decline of 3-32@1/2.

THE INDIAN WAR. Trouble among the Reservation Indians—U. S. Marshal and Indian Agents Killed, &c.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 6. Trouble is reported among the reservation Indians in southeastern Nevada. Augustus Ash, U. S. Marshal, and Holland and Carter, Indian agents, were killed at the reservation. One of the murderers was captured at St. George, Utah.

PORTLAND, OREGON, July 6. The Malheur Indians, Baker county, Oregon, are restless, and fears are entertained that they will effect a junction with the hostiles.

MARYLAND. Removal of an Obstruction to Navigation, &c.

BALTIMORE, July 6. The Merchants' Exchange reading rooms has a notice posted to-day, stating that the wreck of the Norwegian bark Azov, sunk by a collision some time since and obstructing navigation in mid channel, off Back River light, near the entrance of the Chesapeake, has been entirely removed by blasting. The wreck was removed by private subscription from Baltimore merchants.
