The Indians captured a party of eight gentlemen and two ladies on Lower Geyser basin, Friday evening last. The hostiles will probably cross Stinking river about one hundred miles south of Crow agency.

A Man Killed in a Quarrel About

Horse-Trade. Special Telegram to Richmond Dispatch.

NORFOLK, VA., Sept. 10.

A difficulty occurred at the store of Messrs. Smith & Miller, of North Landing, in Norfolk county, about 5 o'clock Saturday evening, between a man by the name of Lemuel Gray and one by the name of George T Wright. Gray met Wright, and spoke very insultingly to him. Both parties went out together, and after getting outside the quarrel was renewed, when Gray threatened to fill Wright "fall of holes," and, after requesting the crowd to stand aside, was in the act of drawing a pistol when Wright drew his revolver and shot Gray, the ball striking him in the region of the heart and severing an artery, resulting in his death within ten minutes.

## Vellow Fever-Patal Cases in Fernandina-The Situation.

JACKSONVILLE, FLA., Sept. 10.

The fatal termination of two cases of yellow fever at Fernandina last night, and the reports of new cases, together with the advice of physicians to citizens to leave that city. has thrown the whole community into great excitement. Quarantine has been established against Fernandina in all the principal towns in the State. An extra train arrived at Baldwin from Fernandina, crowded with fugitives, and many will leave in the morning. Only two severe cases are reported to-night. The total number of deaths thus far from fever is seven. Physicians claim that the disease has assumed a milder form.
