The residence of Mr. DuBrutz Cutlar, on Second, between Walnut and Red Cross streets, was burglariously entered on Wednesday night last, while that gentleman and his family were absent from the city. Entrance was effected through a window open ing upon the front yard and leading into the pantry, the burglar removing a slat to one of the blinds, apparently by means of a small saw, thrusting his hand through the aperture and undoing the fastenings to the blinds, then inserting his knife blade between the sash, both of which are moveable, and sliding back the catch, when the window was hoisted and he went in.
