THE RETURN OF BRISK TIMES.

Unwonted Aufmation in the Busimens Streets of New York. New York Bulletin, Wednesday. |

It may be doubted whether at any period since the close of the war that part of the city known as the dry goods district has exhibited so much real animation as at present. Yesterday it was no easy matter for pedestrians to move along Broadway and the streets on either side, on the way from Broome down to Chambers, owing to the transfer of merchandise to the trucks, consigned to almost all parts of the country, particularly the West and Southwest. Many houses are at work by gas light to fill orders. Another proof of commercial activity is the frequent blockades of drays in Hudson street, at the New York Central and Hudson Railroad freight depot, as well as at and along the wharves of the coastwise steamers. Nor are these signs of reviving commercial activity confined to the lower part of the city. The hotels are receiving large accessions to their list of guests, the majority of whom are merchants from the country, come to effect purchases. Large numbers of our citizens-merchants, bankers and other business men-who have been spending the summer in Europe, are also' returning by every steamer, and the presence of these, within the past few days, is a noticeable feature of the "street" and the commercial exchanges.

Damage Done by the Cyclone.

HOUSTON, TEX., Sept. 20. The following is the estimated damage by the late cyclone around Galveston : The government works in Bolivar channel, including a portion of the fleet, \$75,000; the Galveston, Houston and Henderson railroad, loss of track and the bay bridge, \$20,000 ; the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe railroad, loss of track and bridge, \$20,000 ; cotton presses, \$18,500 ; incompleted buildings in the city, \$9,500; bath houses on the beach, \$3,500; twenty small schooners capsized, loss \$5,000; private buildings and property, \$10,000.




