OUTLINES.

Thirty-five thousand dollars at Columbus, Ohio. — \$10,000 at Newark, N. J. — The general aspect of the war news seems favorable to the Turks.

Since our last report there have been three deaths from yellow fever at Fernandina, and twenty new cases.

Our latest advices from the seat of war show no very important changes, but they are in the main unfavorable to the Russians.

Mr. T. C. Platt, who was chosen temporary Chairman of the New York State Convention yesterday, said the solid, earnest Republicans spurned the thought that the mission of the Republican party was ended.

A dispatch from Washington informs us that Gen. A. C. Jones, who has been on a tour of observation for the Department of Agriculture, reports a most encouraging state of affairs in the South.

Things begin to smell a little of "villanous salt-petre" out in Texas. It is now reported that the Lone Star State will immediately organize several regiments for active service on the Rio Grande.

Our telegrams report that a train on the Illinois Central railroad was thrown from the track yesterday by masked men, and that seven passengers were killed and a number wounded.
