OUTLINES.

The nomination of W. C. Goodloe as Minister to the Netherlands will go to the Senate on Monday. The attitude of the French Right and Left is factious; it is thought the Senate will not encourage the conflict desired by the Ministry.

Baptist State Convention. [Raleigh News Report Concensed.] THIRD DAY.

The report of the Sunday School Board was taken up as the special order of the hour. Rev. J. J. James regarded the Sunday School work as one of the most important of the denomination, and the only hope of the Baptists were the Sunday Schools.

Maj. W. A. Graham moved to strike out so much of the report as affords to a removal of the Board. Carried.

Rev. Theo. Whitfield thought the Board deserved the thanks of the Convention. He was very much in love with the Little Leader plan of the Board. This Board has been exceedingly liberal with their own funds.

Rev. F. H. Jones felt proud of the work the Board had done. If there was any work that was near his heart it was the Sunday School, and one in which he was actively engaged. He thought we needed system in our contributions to benevolence, and the Board had given us a system that was highly commendable.

Rev. F. M. Jordan spoke against Union Sunday Schools, and urged the churches to have their own Sunday Schools, and to patronize our own papers and publishing houses, and closed with some observations from his work in the State.

Col. J. H. Heck had no speech to make; the report of the Board was his speech. He then tells of Mrs. W. H. Dodd, of Raleigh, and of her great work; of the conversion of J. S. Allen through her efforts. He

also gives incidents in the life of Rev. A. D. Cohen; how, through the efforts of a woman Sunday School teacher, he had been brought to God. He then explains the working of the Little Leader plan.

President Kerr, being called out by the convention, delivered one of the most powerful and eloquent speeches on the Sunday school question that it has ever been our privilege to listen to.

The report was then adopted, and a recess for dinner was taken. The special order, being the report of the Board of Education. The secretary read the report of the Board.

Prof. L. B. Mills stated that one or two associations were educating young ministers that were not reported by the Board. During the war and since there were very few common schools, and the boys had not had the opportunity to go to school.

The Convention had an interesting and enthusiastic discussion this afternoon on the educational enterprises of the church. There was a large number of persons present in addition to the delegates to the Convention.

Adjutant General Jones has issued General Orders No. 17, which are to the effect that in accordance with the sixth section of the "Act for the establishment of the North Carolina State Guard," the colored military organizations now existing will be organized into battalions, those in the First Division to compose the Fourth Battalion, as follows: Company A, Oak City Blues; Company B, Newbern Rifle Cadets; Company C, Newbern Guards, and Company D, Oberlin Vance Guards.

Those in the Second District will compose the Fifth Battalion, as follows: Company A, Hanover Light Infantry (Wilmington); Company B, Cape Fear Light Infantry (Wilmington); Company C, Howard Light Infantry; Company D, Fayetteville Rifle Guard, and Company E, Charlotte Blues.

The company officers of the Fourth Battalion will meet at Goldsboro on Wednesday, November 21st, to elect a Major, and the officers of the Fifth Battalion at Wilmington on the same day to elect a Lieutenant Colonel and Majors for the respective battalions.
