MacMahon vacillates. He now de mands that he shall have the appointing of three Ministers in the new Cabinet. His Bourbonism apnears to be intense.

It appears now that Servia will take a part in the war in spite of the remonstrances of Austria. The news is that her troops have crossed the frontier themselves on Ottoman territory. What bearing this will have upon the war further than strengthening the Russians we are unable to anticipate.

Madame Janauschek will begin an engagement in Richmond on January 7th in new roles, and Miss Mary Anderson will appear in "Evadne," "lagomar," and "Meg Merrilles" January 23d, 24th and 25th. Can we not induce these great actresses to give Wilmington at least two nights each ?

The Russians lost quite heavily in the battles of Mariani and Elena. They admit fifty officers and eighteen hundred privates and officers killed and wounded, and the loss of eleven cannon. They claim that on the 6th instant they drove the right wing of the Turkish army, numbering ten thousand men, from Slatantza to Bebrona. The health of the Czar is reported good, and his intended return to St. Petersburg is confirmed. Plevna is expected to fall by first of January. Horses are getting scarce in the Turkish army, and the street-car horses of Constantinople have been impressed.

REPORT OF THE GRAND JURY:

The Grand Jury inspected the Poor House and found it in fair condition, with general appearance of cleanliness, and a sufficient amount of fuel, clothing, hospital stores and provisions on hand, together with some sour flour and crackers, said to

be for hogs. Examined and questioned the inmates, some 44 in number, and found them gene-

rally satisfied. We would suggest the heating of the insane quarters by pipes of steam or hot wa-ter, as fires would be dangerous to the inmates. We would also suggest the propriety of repairing the piazzas generally, and pla-cing substantial blocks or pillars of brick

under the hospital and insane quarters. Visited the Work House, and found it in possession of two prisoners, the others, four in number, being absent, and, from what we could see and ascertain, conclude that a sentence to the Work House, in our opin-

ion, amounts to no punishment. Visited the jail and found it in a cleanly condition. Found 5 males and 7 females from New Hanover, for various charges, and 8 male prisoners from other counties. There were no complaints whatever from any of the prisoners, and the provisions were very good and in sufficient quantities.
