

### WASHINGTON.

Coining of the Trade Dollar to be Resumed-The Louislans Contented Case-Unfavorable Report Anticipated in Case of Williamson for New Oricans Collectorship.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.

The Cabinet has decided to resume the coinage of the trade dollar at the Philadelphia mint.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

Austria not Satisfied with Peace Conditions-The Porte Ready to Accept any Terms - Count Andrassy and Lord Derby Unite in a Joint Note to Bussia-The Credit Vote in English House of Commons-Large Majority Expected for Government-Anti-Russian Feeling in England-Terrible Suffering Among the War Refugees, &c. LONDON, January 30.

No doubt there is a little misunderstanding between St. Petersburg and Vienna. Austria, it seems, expected that the conditions of peace would be submitted to a European congress, or, at least, communi-cated for approval to the members of the Triple Alliance. . The Vienna correspondent of the *limes* 

telegraphs the following:

Whether the preliminary conditions have been signed or not has become of purely a secondary importance. The Porte, at any rate, has approved them, and ac-cording to all accounts is quite ready to accept almost anything else which the Czar may propose, merely to prevent the Russians from executing the threat of marching on

Constantinople." \* The *Ielegraph's* Vienna dispatch says Austria's refusal to annex Bosnia and Her-Austria's refusat to antex boshia and Her-zegovina is confirmed on ministerial au-thority. Andrassy will sanction no measure calculated directly or indirectly to bring about the ruin of the Ottoman Empire. Mr. Davis, of West Virginia, read from the report of Jencks, made to the House of Representatives, to the extent that three persons had been detailed from the Pension office to act as clerks of the Republican Congressional Committee in this city.

HOUSE.—After a great deal of discus-sion, in committee of the Whole, on the bill extending until July 1st, 1878, the time for the withdrawal of distilled spirits from bond, a substitute offered by Mr. Foster, of Ohio, was adopted, declaring that it is inexpedient to reduce the tax on whiskey. The House by a vote of yeas 146, nays 112, adopted the substitute of the committee of the Whole.

WASHINGTON.

Spicy Correspondence-Some Pertinent Questions Asked of Hon. W. E. Chandler, and his Reply-Sliver Twenty Cent Pleces to be Discontinued, &c.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.

The general principles on which the tariff bill are based are reduction and simplifica-tion, and with sections directly looking to an enlargement of our foreign trade. The schedules and classifications of the present tariff are followed. A slight reduction is made, averaging about twenty per cent. of the present rates in the entire list, though in wines, brandies, cigars and other articles of like character there is no reduction. There are no compound duties, the taxes being either specific or advalorem. There are no special lists, every article that is not dutiable is admitted free without specifica-tion or enumeration. The present number of articles in the tariff laws is reduced to about 500 all told in this bill. Changes have been made from advalorem to specific wherever practicable. It is claimed that this bill will reduce the cost of commission from \$7,250,000 to less than \$3,000,000. The bill proposes to raise \$154,946,000, as estimated by Treasury experts, upon the average of imports for the past six years.

### PORSIGN INTELLIGENCE.

Great Suffering and Distress Among Reingees in Constantinople-Action ence to Bussla's Movements-The Czar's Assurances Said to be Delib-crately Evaded - A motion to be Made to Place the Army and Navy on a War Footing-Probable Important European Combination -Sinking of a Turkish Vessel and Browning of the Crew.

LONDON, Jan. 80.

Special correspondents of the London newspapers continue to give details of immonse distress prevailing. They state that smallpox and typhus fever have broken out among the refugees, and efforts are making to send them to Asia.

It is apprehended that the increased population of Constantinople will occasion

a scarcity of provisions. Thousands of refugees arrived in the cap-ital Monday. Masy are huddled in open spots knee-deep in mud and water. The wholesale exodus from Roumelia is unabated.

In the House of Commons this afternoon Mr. Bedford Clapperton Trevilian, Conser-vative member for Gravesend, gave notice that he would move to-morrow that the House, while giving the government due credit for maintaining the policy deter-mined upon, after the solemn assurances of the Czar that he desired only immunity for the Christian subjects of the Porte, and aimed at no aggrandizements whatever, is of the opinion that these assurances are being deliberately evaded by the proposed terms of peace and the advance of the Rus-sian army, and believes the time has come when the immediate action of England is an absolute necessity, and requests forth-with estimates for placing the army and

navy on a war footing. Mr. Pim represents the strong Yurophile

section of the House. The Central News states that Austria, declines to commit herself to joint action declines to commit herself to joint action with England, unless previously assured that the British ministry is safe against the assault of opposition, which might leave Austria isolated at a later stage, and that the ministry intend, pending a vote, to furnish the requisite guarantee. If the ministry obtain a large majority a very im-portant European combination will appear.

The commander of the Russian steamer Constantine reports that he left Sebastopol for a cruise on the 22d instant, and approached Batoum on the 26th, where there were seven Turkish vessels. The Constantine sent a white head torpedo against a screw steamer, which was on guard outside, and sank her immediately. The crew were all drowned. The Constantine has returned to Sebastopol.

LONDON, Jan. 30. Gladstone, in accepting the address from the Liberal Association of Oxford, to-day, said he considered the sending of a fleet into the Dardanelles an act of war and a breach of neutrality. The vote of six millions would be taken by Turkey as an encourage ment to prolong the war. He feared the vote would be carried by the failure of the Irish members to oppose it. He hoped, for Ireland's honor, that those who had them-





LONDON, January 30. The Conservatives in the House of Commons are expected to give a solid support to the credit vote on Thursday. One or two defections, not more, are probable. The Liberals, on the contrary, are divided. There will be numerous abstentions, and There will be numerous abstentions, and some Liberals will support government. The Home Rulers are not yet determined on their course, but will probably mostly abstain from voting. Such of them as vote, mainly Ultramontanes, will support the government. The majority for credit is already estimated as over one thousand. Meetings are being held throughout the country to influence. Parliament against

country to influence Parliament against credit, but mostly by the Liberal or reform or peace organizations. No non-partisan

meeting has yet been attempted. The open-air meeting at Sheffield, yes-terday, was turned into an anti-Russian demonstration. An amendment to an original resolution against credit was carried inal resolution against credit was carried by an immense majority, declaring that the cause of peace and the interests of the empire will be best promoted by supporting the foreign policy of the government. The meeting numbered over twenty thousand persons. They sang patriotic songs, cheer-ed Lord Beaconsfield's name, and greeted Lord Commentation and the bissest and Lord Carnarvon's name with hisses and cries of traitor.

Some of the leading provincial newspa-pers are taking an anti-Russian tone.

The Central Committee of the Red Crescent Society telegraphs from Constantino-ple an appeal to all kindred committees of the Red Cross, all benevolent institutions, and all kind hearted men of all countries. It says a considerable number of wounded It says a considerable number of wounded soldiers are flocking into Constantinople from all parts of the country. Nearly one hundred and fifty thousand refugees, vic-tims of the war, flying from the scene of military operations, deprived of all means of existence, and almost naked, constitute the situation, which, considering the lim-ited resources of the Red Crescent Society, might end in disaster and general calamity.

## PHILADELPHIA.

The Steam Line to Brazil-Arrest Frank Leslie for Libel. PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 30.


