It appears now to depend to a great extent upon what Austria may determine whether there will be peace or war. Bismarck, in the meantime, is still striving to arrange matters so Congress can be held. He is said to have asked England for a specific statement of her demands.

Mail Service Between Wilmington and Foreign Ports,

We understand that Messrs. F. W. Kerchner and I. B. Grainger, the special committee appointed by our city authorities, Chamber of Commerce and Produce Exchange, to proceed to Washington and urge upon our Representative in Congress, Hon. A. M. Waddell, the advantages likely to accrue to our city from the passage of the general law for mileage compensation for the sea carriage of the mails between the different ports in the United States and foreign ports in American steamships, as recently recommended by the Exporters Convention, held in the city of Washington which was composed of representatives from all parts of the country, have returned, and report favorable progress.

The Attempted Capture of the Aileged Chicken Thief-Arrest of Bill

Mivers, &c. Officers Gordon, Davis, Goodman and Walker, the force selected by the Mayor to endeavor to effect the capture of the alleged chicken thief, alluded to in our last issue, left the city at 7 o'clock Friday evening, and secreted themselves in the bushes close to the house of Melvina Manning, near Jumping Run, where they remained in concealment and on the look out until about 5 o'clock yesterday morning, when, upon a preconcerted signal, they surrounded the house. Upon entering, however, they found that the object of their search was not present, but discovered Bill Rivers, the colored man who was alleged by Melvina Manning to be the owner of the gun which the supposed chicken thief brandished so threateningly into the faces of Officers Gordon and King, on the occasion of their first visit to the premises Friday morning. He was taken into custody, brought to the city and lodged in the guard house. No information could be obtained from Rivers as to the whereabouts or identity of the so called Jones, but he was very free in his comments upon the prowess of the fugitive, remarking that it would take the whole police force of the city to effect his capture, evidently intending to convey the

impression that he is a desperate fellow. There seems to be but little doubt that the so-called Tom Jones, or Johnson, as he was at first designated by the woman, Melvina Manning, when arrested, is no other than the notorious Tom Johnson, alias Elri or Elvi, the escaped convict, for whose capture a reward of \$200 has been offered by the Governor.

Bill Rivers and the woman and children are held for the present to await further developments.

New Hampshire Memorial Institute On account of several important errors which occurred in our article in yesterday's its proper department, will be found on the STAR, under the above heading, we reproduce it corrected to-day:

> The Winter term of the New Hampshire Memorial Institute, which has now been in successful operation in this city for the past twelve years, for the last five of which it has been under the charge of the present efficient Superintendent, came to an end yesterday. The school is supported by the American Missionary Association, and is devoted to the education of the colored people in this city, the same Society having, we learn, schools in several Southern cities. The Rev. D. D. Dodge is the Superintendent, assisted in the Normal Department by Miss Lucy Goodwin, as Principal, and Misses H. L. Fitts and Julia Goodwin as Assistants; and in the Primary Department by Miss E. A. Warner, who has the entire charge. There is also an afternoon and evening class, with Miss Martha Moore as

> This Association is extensively engaged n the work of education and formerly had the colored free schools of this city under its charge. The New Hampshire Memorial Institute is an outgrowth of that work, having taken its present form since the county assumed the whole care of the other schools.

A final exhibition, consisting of dialogues, songs, recitations, speeches and reading of compositions, took place at the school room, corner of Seventh and Nun streets, last evenign, and, although the room was crowded, the utmost good order was preserved throughout, and the strictest attention paid to the exercises, which were of an interesting nature, creditably reflecting alike upon

the pupils and their instructors. The school has an average attendance of about one hundred pupils, and it speaks volumes for the managers that they are able to control and direct this number in the pathway of knowledge with such satisfactory results. It is clear that it must require much patience and labor, and apparently neither have been lacking.

Hanover county, held at the Court House at 10 A. M., Saturday, March 30th, 1878, on motion of E. D. Hall, Esq., John S. James, Esq., was made temporary Chairman, and John Cowan, Esq., temporary Secretary.

The Secretary was directed to call the roll, and the following named Justices responded: From Wilmington Township-John S.

James, John C. Millis, Edward D. Hall, C. D. Myers, John Cowan, John M. Henderson, James W. King, O. G. Paraley, Jr., L. H. Bowden, Henry Schulken, John L. Cantwell, D. G. Worth, E. H. McQuigg, Joseph C. Hill. Anthony Howe, Thomas M. Smith.

There being a majority of the Justices of the county present, the Chairman stated that the meeting was duly organized. By request of the Chair, E. D. Hall, Esq., stated the object of the meeting to be to make a permanent organization, and appoint a committee toreport at a subsequent meeting in reference to the machinery of the election law. Then in August the Magistrates elect County Commissioners and also decide whether the county shall have Treasurer; also, to take into consideration whether it shall be urged upon the Legisature to abolish the Criminal Court and an Inferior Court be established instead.

J. N. Maffitt, Esq., then moved to effect permanent organization of the Board by proceeding to elect a permanent Chairman and Secretary.

Justice James was declared elected. On motion of Justice Bowden, the election of the Chairman was declared unanimous. Justice Bowden then moved that Justice

Cowan be unanimously elected Secretary. J. N. Maffitt, Esq., then offered the following resolution which was adopted:
