An Old Husband Killed for Living too Long. [Cincinnati Enquirer special.]

LYNCHBURG, VA., April 29. A sensational tragedy was enacted in Carroll county, Va., last Saturday night. It has just come to light, and the particulars that have reached here are somewhat conflicting. Last December Mand Harris was united in the holy bonds of matrimony to Captain Lucius D. Travers. She was twenty one; he was upwards of three score and ten. It was understood that at the time she married the old man he was in feeble health and was likely to drop off at any hour, leaving young Mand \$100,000 in Government securities. Months rolled on, and instead of dying the Captain grew younger and stronger every day. In fact, he was heard to remark a few days ago that he was good for twenty years yet.

It is supposed the husband's returning youth so disappointed the young bride that she took his life. At any rate, be that the case or not, the cruel woman cut his throat from ear to ear with a butcher knife while he slept soundly by her side on the night of the 27th. She afterward dragged the corpse (she was of pow-erful muscle), and just before daylight threw it in a creek, one hundred yards from the house. The body floated down the stream two miles, and was discovered Sunday afternoon by three fishermen. This morning an inquest was held. The blood was discovered in the chamber of Capt. Travers, and circumstantial evidence was strong against the young bride, and to day, before the coroner's jury, that lady burst into a paroxysm of weeping and confessed the crime. It is supposed that Mrs. Travers was in love with a young lawyer of Balti-more, to whom she hoped some day to be united. She is now in jail. understand the Baltimore man is in this city, and he attempted to-night to commit suicide.
