New Features of the Fraud Investigation-Packard's Modified Creed on the Louisiana Case-Eliza Pinksten Gone Back on the Bepublicans. Special Dispatch to the Baltimore Sun ! WASHINGTON, June 30.

PACKARD'S CHANGE OF HEART. The testimony of Mr. Packard beore the Louisiana sub-committee, at New Orleans, yesterday, shows that he has still considerable heartburning over the refusal of Mr. Haves to uphold his government by military aid, although his disappointment has been somewhat mitigated by the office which has been conferred upon him. Mr. Packard, like some other Repubican witnesses who have been called before the Potter committee, tones down his sentiments and opinions as previously expressed in private conversations. For instance, he thinks much better of the commission sent by the President to Louisiana in April of last year, and is now satisfied, according to his testimony, that the gentlemen composing it would have broken up the Nicholls Legislature if they could have done it, and would have gladly recognized him as Governor. This is a remarkable change in Mr. Packard's opinions, as he has several times assured the writer of this that the commission's main purpose was to break up his government. and that its influence was exerted to induce secessions from his Legislature. Mr. Packard also states now that he could have maintained his government without troops if the President had only recognized him. At the time the commission was in New Orleans not a single member of Mr. Packard's government, from him

The confession of Eliza Pinkston adds another item to that long list of facts of perjury, forgery and wrong through which the vote of Louisiana Mills, at Rockingham, was cast for Hayes. HOT HEATON VS. POSTER.

Fight at Burgaw-Heaton Attacks Poster with a Bilek - Poster Pire Upon His Adversary... Robedy Hurt

dideky and before the assembling of the Senatorial Convention at Burgaw, F. W. Foster, of this city, was standing on the street in conversation with a colored man by the name of J. C. Scott, a well known shoe-maker of this place, when James Heaton passed in that direction, and upon avriving in immediate proximity to the parties suddenly commenced a furious attack upon Foster, giving him two severe blows with a hickory walking stick. The second blow brought Foster to his knees. by which time he had get his pistol out. when he leveled it at Heaton, who was backing off, and fired, but witheffect. He then took deliberate at Heaton and was about to fire the second time, when his arm was suddealy seized by one Wash Green, dolored, and the point of the weapon turned up as it exploded, the ball going through the weatherbearding of a house near the scene of the conflict. At this juncture another colored man seized the pistol and wrenched it from the hand of Poster, when Heaton took it from the colored man and made a threatening demonstration, as if he intended to repeat the assault upon Foster, when he was seized and prevented from renewing the difficulty. In the meantime Foster had been taken to the hotel near by, where he remained for some time in nearly an unconscious state, suffering from the effects of the blows received upon the head.

Later on the parties were arrested and carried before Justice Bloodworth. Burgaw, who, after hearing the evidence in the case, ordered the defendants to give bond in the sum of \$250 each for their appearance at the approaching term of the Superior Court for Pender county, which convenes next Monday, which was furnished and the parties were released.

The above is in substance the statement of Scott and others, who say they witnessed - Several of our Charlotte friends, clares that as he was passing the spot where Foster was standing, the latter made an insulting remark to him, whereupon he made the assault as above stated.

The affair created a great deal of excitement among the crowd at Burgaw, and upon the reception of the news here it produced no little comment the facts at first heing considerably exaggerated, even to Registration in the First Ward, the extent that Heaton had been killed.


