QUARANTINE MATTERS.

Letter from Dr. Curtie. QUARANTINE STATION, July 20. Editor Star: So far as I am concerned, I do not desire to stir up any further the subject of yellow fever in Wilmington. Enough has been said and written on it to produce the opinion in the minds of the citizens of the country that it is an infected and plague-ridden city. Now, so far is that from the truth, that I believe it can be confidently asserted that Wilmington is one of the healthiest cities on the Atlantic Yellow fever has visited that city but once in thirty years The quarantine establishment opposite Deep Water Point has intercepted it invariably since its establishment there, and kept it out of your city. Some time since I noticed in one of your city papers that Dr. Woodworth was astonished to find no adequate hospital accommodations in this port. Now Dr. Woodworth visited Smithville, spent just half an hour in conference with the writer, and returned to Wilmington, visiting no place connected with quarantine. I notice further, from the STAR, that the Mayor of Wilmington is of the opinion that there are no suitable provisions for taking care of the sick and disinfecting vessels. I am not aware that he has visited the Quarantine Station, or made any examination entitling im to an opinion.

I will say, therefore, if you will permit me, that all such statements, when pub-lished, are scattered broadcast through the country, are very injurious to the interests of Wilmington, and that they have not the slightest foundation in truth.

The Quarantine Hospital, at Price's Creek. although not a costly or imposing structure, is amply sufficient for all the requirements of the port. Ten years' experience has proven it so. It has never been found wanting in space, or proper arrangements for the care of the sick who have been placed in it. The quarantine regulations are established

and put in force by the physician in charge, and they have the force of law, and are obeyed and respected accordingly. When all the requirements of quarantine have been fulfilled vessels are discharged, and are free to pursue their voyage, I notice certain ordinances of the city have been pro-mulgated. With those I have no power or wish to interfere, and I presume they will be executed by the proper executive officers

Permit me, Mr. Editor, to express the wish that a few articles could be written for your columns, extolling the health of Wilmington and its freedom from all pestilences, and that these might supersede the periodical crop of yellow fever articles. Then, after a year or two of cheerful correspondence, perhaps the citizens of North Carolina might feel willing to venture visits Wilmington in pursuit of their business their pleasure, and be able to enjoy the charming hospitalities of your citizens, unalloyed by visions of disease and death.
