Sir Stafford Northcote, re-plying to Mr. Fawcett, said he could not promise that the reforms promised in Asiatic Turkey and the guarantees for their execution, which are yet to be agreed upon, would be submitted to Parliament previously for its sanction. Mr. Fawcett gave notice that he would introduce a resolution declaring that such a prior submission to the House of Commons is necessaria.

RICHMOND, August 2. Last night two negroes entered the store and dwelling of Mr. Mosby Henley, in Goochland county, fifteen miles west of Richmond, for the purpose of robbery, but were frightened off. Mr. Henley went to the window with a gun, and while leaning out was shot in the face. This was followed by another shot through the panel of the door, the ball striking Mrs. Dinnard, Henley's mother-in-law, in the abdomen. After this the thieves, without entering the house, demanded money and boots, giving the sizes they wanted, and other articles, the sizes they wanted, and other articles, all of which were given them by Henley's wife, whereupon they left. Henley recognized the man who shot him as one of two negroes seen loitering about the neighborhood for several days. The county people are astir and after them. Henley's wound, though serious, is not considered fatal, but Mrs. Dinnard will probably die.
