

THE GERMAN ELECTION—United Liberal Party the Majority—A Swimming Contest—Cardinal Franchi's Funeral, &c.

LONDON, August 2. The Berlin correspondent of the Times telegraphs that as far as can be judged by the returns of the election received up to the present, the relative positions of the various parties are unchanged. The National Liberals Electoral Committee estimate that their party has lost fifteen seats. The Conservatives have gained twenty. The United Liberals will thus still have a majority in Parliament.

Regarding the rumor that Tolden refused to withdraw a man from the vicinity of Constantinople before the withdrawal of the British fleet, a dispatch from Berlin to the Morning Post says Gortschakoff made a solemn promise at Berlin that the Russian forces should be withdrawn upon the evacuation of Yarna and Shumla.

Capt. Webb, the famous swimmer, has commenced the feat of swimming thirty-three hours continuously without rest in the Thames. He dived off the pier at Woolwich at 6 o'clock this morning and is now swimming towards Gravesend, on reaching which place he will turn with the tide and swim back to Woolwich, expecting to reach there at 6 o'clock to-morrow and repeat the trip.

The Echo states that, owing to the prostrate condition of the cotton trade, Messrs. Horby & Son, of Brookhaven, the largest mill owners in the Blackburn District, have given a fortnight's notice to their operatives that they will close their mills.

ROME, Aug. 2. The funeral of the late Cardinal Franchi will be celebrated Monday next. In the meantime audience at the Vatican will be suspended.

UTAH.

A Town Entirely Destroyed by Fire—Man Burned to Death. NEW YORK, Aug. 2. A special from Salt Lake City says a fire yesterday destroyed the town of Alta Utra. The place contained about two hundred wooden buildings, all of which are in ashes.

Judge Vaine, who was stopping at the Swan House, was burned to death. A train has been sent from Salt Lake to bring in the destitute. Loss \$100,000 to \$200,000.

MEMPHIS.

National Greenback Party Elect their Entire Ticket by Large Majorities—Fatal Quarrel. MEMPHIS, August 2. In the county election yesterday the National Greenback party elected their entire ticket, thirteen candidates, by majorities ranging from 4,000 to 6,000, and polling 16,000 votes.

During a quarrel Joseph Day, colored Democrat, fired at but missed Dick Dougherty, National. Dougherty then shot Day, killing him.

NEW YORK.

Another Dishonest Treasurer Comes to the Front. NEW YORK, August 2. Isaac Rohman, Secretary and Treasurer of the New York Optical Company, has disappeared. It is asserted that he has taken a large amount of money belonging to the firm. Klopman & Fallman, composing the New York Optical Company, are also partners in a dry goods firm in Galveston, with an agency in this city. Mr. Klopman said he could not yet tell how much of the firm's funds are missing.

Our Night Reports.

FOREIGN INTELLIGENCE.

The Harrington Resolutions in the British Commons—Probable Adjournment of Parliament on the 17th—Austrian Affairs—The Prayers for Peace—Affairs in Asiatic Turkey, &c.

LONDON, Aug. 2. The Morning Post says an attempt will be made to get the debate in the House of Commons on the Harrington resolution protracted until the 6th inst., but this is not favored by the leaders of either side, and a division is expected at 2 o'clock Saturday morning. Considerable pairing is expected. It is also stated that every effort is making to end the session of Parliament on the 17th inst.

The Archbishop of Canterbury, Primate, has issued to the clergy of his diocese a recommendation that they who, during the past few months, have prayed for peace, should now, through general thanksgiving, return thanks to God, that their prayers have thus far been answered.

It is reported that the men belonging to the Austrian army on leave will shortly be ordered to rejoin their posts. Troops have been placed not only at 324, but at other points on the Danubian coast.

WOOLWICH, Aug. 2. Capt. Webb has relinquished his attempt for the present in consequence of high winds. He left the water at ten minutes past three o'clock this afternoon, having swum twenty-two miles in nine hours.

It is stated that Monsignor C. Alois Maella, Papal Nuncio at Munich, has arrived at an understanding with Bismarck relative to a motus vivendi between Germany and the Vatican.

LONDON, August 2. In the House of Commons, this afternoon, the debate on Harrington's resolution was resumed. Sir Stafford Northcote, replying to Mr. Fawcett, said he could not promise that the reforms promised in Asiatic Turkey and the guarantees for their execution, which are yet to be agreed upon, would be submitted to Parliament previously for its sanction. Mr. Fawcett gave notice that he would introduce a resolution declaring that such a prior submission to the House of Commons is necessary.

Fourth and last, free handicap steeple chase, over the usual course of two and three-quarter miles, was won by Walter Redding second and Dandy third. Time 6:46. Coronet fell at the second water-pipe.

DAKOTA TERRITORY.

Outrage and Robbery by Masked Men. DEADWOOD, August 2. James Anderson, a milkman, living near Deadwood, started for town early this morning on his regular trip. When he was about five miles from his ranch he was stopped by five masked men, bound, gagged, robbed, and left in the edge of the woods. The robbers took about \$30 in money and the span of horses from his wagon. They then proceeded to the ranch, where they appropriated three more horses and three saddles to their own use, telling the man who was in charge of the ranch to go and liberate Anderson.

A TORNAO.

Terrible Damage to Life and Property. CINCINNATI, August 2. The miners of the Tuscawassa Coal Company, at Urickville, Ohio, struck yesterday against a reduction of wages. Advice from southeastern Indiana state that a tornado swept through that section yesterday, damaging crops, trees and buildings quite seriously. At Liberty the Methodist Church was badly injured.

Reports of the same tornado have also been received from points in this State and from Illinois. At Ripedale, Ill., an extensive file factory, railroad warehouse, hotel and several residences are in ruins, and a number of persons seriously injured.

WASHINGTON.

The Mexican Awards, &c. WASHINGTON, August 2. No time has yet been fixed for the paying of the Mexican awards. Official notice will be given by the Department of State when it shall be ready to do so. The law requires that deductions be made from the awards due to those who may be found indebted to the government, and this involves inquiry at the Treasury Department.

ELECTRIC SPARKS.

The Democrats of the Fourteenth District of Ohio have nominated Gibson Atherton for Congress. The striking tug men at Chicago have resumed work, their employers giving them their old wages. Count de Bodoia, Russian Consul General at New York, died Monday night at the White Sulphur Springs, Va. J. A. Billings, of Morgan county, has been unanimously nominated for Congress by the Democratic Convention of the 9th District of Georgia. The Democrats of the Fifteenth District, at Mt. Vernon, Ohio, yesterday nominated Judge George W. Geddes, of Mansfield, for Congress, on the third ballot. A man from New Orleans was sent to the Cincinnati hospital with yellow fever yesterday. A negro, recently from the same place, died with the fever at the hospital Thursday. A fire Thursday in Levy's dollar store, New Orleans, almost destroyed the building and stock, valued at \$50,000; injury \$40,000. Phillip & Werlein, pianos, &c., damaged \$10,000; Frederickson & Co., damaged \$10,000. Total loss \$100,000.

The Boston Journal says Tappan's case will be presented to the grand jury which comes in on Monday, and that Tappan will probably be arrested. It further says that Tappan expects this and stands ready to meet the charges.
