The Cape Fear Township Election The Registrar and Inspectors of Election

of Cape Fear Township were arraigned before U. S. Commissioner McQuigg, yesterday morning, on the affidavit of one Als bert Cooper, colored, charged with hindering him from voting at the late election. Cooper had previously made affidavit that the Registrar for that township, A. J Grady, Esq., had refused to allow him to register, but it being shown that Cooper's name was actually on the registration book the prosecution on this score was abandoned, whereupon Cooper made the affidavit above alluded to, claiming that he was prevented from voting. There was no evidence to sustain the charge, and so the case was dismissed.

Subsequently to the above proceed ings a warrant was secured by Justice Grady for the arrest of Cooper, on the charge of porturing himself, and, upon the case being heard by Justice Harriss, yesterday afternoon, defendant was ordered to give a justified bond in the sum of \$200 for his appearance at the next term of the Criminal Court, which was furnished, and he was released from custody.

The Stricken Cities. One of our prominent citizens suggests' that an organized effort be made to raise subscriptions for the yellow fever sufferers of the South and West, and recommends that a committee be appointed to go around among our citizens of means and see how many will agree to give one dollar, or fifty cents, or even twenty-five cents, per day, for this purpose. He says it is the opinion of some that from \$50 to \$100 per day can be raised in this manner, as many would not hesitate to give such small sums each day who would feel unable to subscribe \$5 or \$10 at once. The scheme is worth a trial, and we hope that or some other will be adopted without delay. The deplorable condition of affairs in the stricken cities calls for instant and unceasing efforts in their behalf.
