— Every body is getting ready for Thanksgiving to-morrow. — The public schools will all be closed to-morrow—Thanksgiving Day.

— The weather yesterday was anything else but agreeable, both overhead and under foot. As we go to press it is still cloudy and rainy.

— The storm-flag was displayed from the Signal Station yesterday as a warning to seamen of what might be expected on the coast.

— Israel Jones, colored, was committed to jail on Monday evening for non-payment of costs in an assault and battery case in Justice Hill's court.

— The Agent of the Helen D'Este troupe, which are to appear at the Opera House on Monday and Tuesday evenings next, was in the city yesterday.

— Sheriff Manning gives notice that all property on which the tax is not paid by December 1st, will be advertised, which will make additional costs.

— The gipsies, or "omigrants," as they style themselves, are still camping in the neighborhood of the city, and were engaged yesterday in trading and swapping horses.

THE CRIMINAL COURT. No. 2.

It is urged by those who are in favor of abolishing our Criminal Court and substituting an Inferior Court, as it is called in its stead, that the latter would not only answer the same purpose as the former, but that the expense attending it would be infinitely less than the present arrangement.
