THE LEGISLATURE. [Raleigh Observer Report Condensed.]

SENATE. RALEIGH, N. C., Jan. 11, 1879.

Mr. Harris, of Franklin, introduced a resolution that the Finance committee be instructed to report to the Senate a bill providing for a tax on spirituous liquors which shall enforce the idea of the Moffett Bell Punch tax, which tax shall be for the public schools.

BILLS. By Mr. Bryan, of Pender, to regulate the pay of certain officers of the General Assembly. The principal and assistant clerks to receive \$5 per day and mileage at 10 cents per mile; enrolling and engrossing clerk \$4 and mileage; doorkeeper and assistant doorkeepers \$4 and mileage.

By Mr. Henderson, a bill to prohibit the removal of criminal causes to another county, except where the ends of justice absolutely require it. By Mr. Henderson, a bill to define
