RELIGIOUS NEWS

The Rt. Rev. Alexander Neil Bethune, Anglican Bishop of Toronto, died yesterday. Having been Archbishop of York, he was elected Bishop of Niagara and Conductor of Toronto September 19, 1868, and was consecrated to his See January 23, 1867. Cardinal Manning will leave England for Rome early this month and will be absent during the season of Lent. He visits Rome on the special invitation of Pope Leo XIII., to confer with him on matters relating to the organization of the Catholic church in England. The Brooklyn Presbytery yesterday appointed a committee, consisting of three ministers and two elders, to investigate the conduct of the Rev. T. De Witt Talmage, it being the common report that he is guilty of falsehood and deceit and using improper methods in preaching, leading to bring religion into contempt. Another indiscreet clergyman. This time it is the Rev. Robert E. Terry, rector of Christ's Church, Hudson, N. Y., who has got himself into a scrape by writing some very silly and spongy letters to a young lady of his congregation.
